NEFF WILL URGE HUGE SCHOOL FUND

Austin, April 23. Governor Neff will submit to the special summer leg islative session the question of financial aid to public schools and will urge revenue measures to raise the money "in excess of the amount provided in the rural aid bill vetoed," he announced tonight.

The Governor vetoed the 4,000, 000 rural aid bill passed at the regular session. In making his announcement tonight the Governor said:

"I make this statement for the reason that I am receiving from those interested in public school matters a number of letters and petitions asking me to submit this measure at encouraging me to submit this question, as I am as much in favor of giving aid to the public schools of the State as anyone

"From my message in which vetoed the rural aid bill I quote the following: so heartily am I in favor of adequate appropriation for the public schools of the State, that I desire here to record that, if the special session of the Legislature finds the money can be had from any proper source above the necessary running expenses of the government, I shall gladly join in making an appropriation of not only the four mildollars vetoed but for any other reasonable amount the State is financially able to appropri-

"In connection with the submission of this proposition. I shall urge the passage of certain revenue measures which, if enacted into laws, will enable the State to render assistance to the public schools even in excess of the amount provided in the cural aid bill vetoed.

Heavy rains fell here last week and the season will hold for three weeks. People here admit that West Texas ought to be given more adequate representation in the Legislature and congress but they are not blaming Gov. Neff for failure to re-district the state. They very properly say that some of our own ambition politicians are to blame. These people were disposed to make a joke of the secession feeling, with the idea that since division could not be effected except by popular vote and the rest of the state would out vote us on a secession measure, but the Garner resolution to create five states has caused them to go back and sit down They see that with five sections in the scramble there may come a cooperative sentiment that would carry the measure.

The old idea that a republican congress would not favor the creation of more states here may not carry its cld time force, for the reason that Republicans may see a hope of electing some of the new senators.

There is noticeable here the sam: feeling of unrest and uncertainty in businss circles as elsewhere. The cctton market has hit these people hat like it hit us, and these people have come to rely on cotton.

The time was when real estate was a profitable source of revenue but the price of land has probably gone the limit so that there are no longer big profits in dealing in land and home seekers will begin to hunt for cheaper homes. Just as soon as they can be weaned away from the fleshpots of Egypt. There are many enquir ies about land, crops, climate and people in the west and the spirit is moving in them.

SANTA FE CHANGES TIMES

Aarillo, Texas, April 28, 1981. The Santa Fe Railway appounces that a new time card will be effective May 1st, for the entire system. The new card will be ready for publica-

An important change is the return to use of central standard time on the Plains and Slaton division. Durdividing point between the central and mountain time zones was changed from Clovis, New Mexico, to Wayn oka, Oklahoma. This change was unsatisfactory to the people in northwest Texas and Congressman Marvin Jones secured the passage of a law to return northwest Texas to the central time zone

The enforcement of the law was placed with the Interstate Commerce Commission. But no order to change the time was issued by the Commission until recently. When the Santa Fe Railway published a new time card for the plains division March 27th, no order had been received.

When the order was issued by the Commission, no date was fixed for the change of time. When the order was received, the Santa Fe railway had under consideration a new time card for the system to be in effect on May 1st. It was decided not to issue an extra time card just for the short time intervening.

On May 1st Clovis, New Mexico, again becomes the dividing point between the central and mountain time zones. All trains on the Plains division from Waynoka to Clovis and on the Slaton division from Sweetwater to Colvis and Canyon will be operated on Central time after May 1st,




