

Fighting Flies

> Flies are allowed to multiply, and become not only a nuisance, but also hold. The fly population increases gradually, until by August and September they swarm the entire farmstead. The flies which invest any farmstead are usually produced on that farm. Flies prefer horse ma nure for laying their eggs, and the eggs can be prevented from hatching by applying ordinary powdered Borax to their breeding places. Specialist of the United States Depart-

ment of Agriculture have discovered that ten ounces of powdered Borax to eight bushels of manure is sufficient to kill the maggots and prevent all of the flies from developing.

In the case of stables, the method is to sprinkle the Borax in the quantities given above by the means of a flour siften or sieve. Most of the Borax should be applied around the outer edge of the pile as that is where the maggots congregate. The manure should be sprinkled with two or three gallons of water to eight bushels of manure. This does not affect the value of the manure as a fertilizer in any respect.

In the case of garbage, where flies also breed, the Borax should be thoroughly sifted on in the dry form, in the proportion of two ounces to the can of garbage. This will not impair the value of the garbage as a food for hogs, as borax in these small proportions is absolutely harmless.



There are now 329 orphans in the home, ranging in age from babies to high cshool graduates and, by the way, it may be said that the graduates from there rank along with the best^{*}in the state.

The children are enjoying the results of the investment made by their fathers in Odd Fellowship. They are not objects of charity. They are independent wards of the brothers who are under pledge to take care of and educate the children of deceased brothers.

Connie and Corinne Brockman are there, and happy. Connie is now in the high school. They are wards of Snyder Lodge No. 485.

The home farm consists of 286 acres, but there is nothing like enough provisions grown to feed the inmates. Really, the support of the institution comes from a certain part of dues paid by Odd Fellows all over the state, and there is probably not a three-linker in Texas who is not glad to pay his small assessment to maintain the good work.

Just to give you some idea of what it costs to feed these people, a report of Superintenhent Hampeon shows that they use four sacks of flour a day and 200 loaves of bread per week, three sacks of meal for dinner, 25 packages of breakfast food at the morning meal, two gallons syrup, four bushels sweet potatoes and two bushels Irish potatoes daily, 180 pounds bacon or 145 pounds beef per meal, 100 pounds sugar for three days, 30 gallons milk per day, 12 pounds butter for breakfast.

The home economies departments are superintended by widow inmates and the girls are used in groups, or relays, some cooking, some at dishwashing, sewing and laundry work. 

Governer Neff has vetoed the bill which provided for an appropriation of \$2.000.000 a year to aid the rural schools. This was the best rural aid bill the legislature has ever pass-The Governer has pormised to d. submit this bill again at the special session, if other sources of revenue can be found, besides the tax on property. The purpose of this letter is to inform you as to this matter, and to ascertain your wishes. If your schools can continue to prosper without special state aid, htere is no need of my making a struggle to get the the bill passed a second time. If they really need this help, I desire to know this, and to carry out your wishes please write me your opinion. The following may be said to the justice of some of the taxes proposed: In Texas, property bears nearly the whole burden of taxation. Many prosperous people pay nothing for the support of the state government. This is not so in many other states. Natural resources such as oil, coal, sulphur, pay very little revenue to our state. These belong, in a way to the whole people. Much of this wealth pours out to enrich others states, and we chould place on it sufficient tax to retain at least a small portion to educate Texas children.

A tax on amusements, such as theatrical attractions, picture shows, and base-ball games is just. People are able to enjoy these through prosper-ity of the city. The country helps to build the city, and the city should help to build up the country. Country eople, 'as well as city people, are money helps to keep them up, and to jewlery etc. My; how we do howl support city amusements. 


