GOOD RAINS **BRIGHTEN OUTLOOK**

Good rains have fallen in a large part of the county during the past week. Last Friday night the Hermleigh neighborhood got an inch and half of rain and on Saturday night another good one.

The Ira community received a good rain Saturday night and another one Tuesday. The Tuesday rain wet most of the center of the county but did not extend far east of town. The present crop condition with the probable exception of a few localities is very good at this time, except that the cotton is a little late.

From information gathered from the farmers throughout the county there is a considerable acreage of feed stuff including maize, kaffir. corn and all this is up to a good stand and looking well. The wheat has been wonderfully benefitted by these rains, though coming a little late for the best results. Joe Merrett says he while most of the cotton is being planted now and in most instances will come up and grow off better than the early platning.

Most farmers have reduced their cotton acreage and are planting the best seed obtainable. Grass has not suffered and has been good all spring.

With the raising of this fund every Methodist educational institution of the South will be put on its feet and the cause of education in the South will be greatly helped.



COLLEGE EDUCATION FOR BOY

Kentucky Lad Saves Enough From Sale of Litter of Fine Pigs to Pay for Schooling.

Here is the story of how a litter of pigs produced an agricultural college education, a system of farm waterworks and general improvement on a backwoods farm that had only primitive advantages.

The education went to Jeff Anderson, a Kentucky boy of Pulaski county.





Pigs Almost Ready to Roct for Themselves.


Jeff belonged to a boys' club which had been organized by the county agent. He was encouraged to raise a litter of fine pigs under the club system by which the boys applied approved methods and kept account of the results. The pigs sold for a fancy. price. Jeff, who had made sure progress, saved some money from his labor and in 1918 entered the Kentucky

State College of Agriculture for its

short course. He had been used to seeing his mother and other women carry water 150 yards up a hill for washing and cooking. At the agricultural college he realized the convenience and benefit to be gained by running water conducted to a tap in the kitchen. When he returned home he persuaded his father to let him put in a water system. A stand pipe 60 feet, high was built with a 500-gallon tank on top, which gave sufficient pressure to force water to the dwelling 400 feet away. He rigged up a gasoline engine and pump at the spring under the hill. He had learned a little about plumbing, so he did all the pipe fitting in the house. One month's work at odd times, coupled with a little of the knowlege he had



RANGE STOCK IS IMPROVED

All Kinds of Sires, Bulls Especially, Are Receiving Close Scrutiny by Breeders.

In the Western range states, all kinds of sires-bulls especially-are receiving scrutiny by live stock owners. There is increasing evidence that good purchred males have wide influence on the quality of young stock and on the returns from stock-raising operations.

One day recently the United States Department of Agriculture enrolled in the "Better Sires-Retter Stock" movement several ranchmen, each of whom had more than 1,000 head of live stock. One flock of sheep contained 250 purebred lewes-and 3,450 crossbred ewes, the sires being all purebred. A cattle raiser who enlisted in the campaign the same day notifled the department : "I, have disposed of two grade Hereford bulls, recently, having decided to run nothing but purebred sires." This "remark is typical of the progress of the movement in Montann. . . .

TO RESTORE MORGAN STRAIN

Efforts of Department of Agriculture Shown in Recent 300-Mile Test : for Horses.

Efforts of the United States Department of Agriculture to restore the Morgan strain of horses, which had become nearly extinct, showed their effect in the recent 300-mile test for army horses. # **RIDE HAD THRILLS**

Live Stock CURING HORSE'S BAD HABITS In Case of Chronic Balker Course of Training Will Be Needed to Overcome Fault.


Horses that have been properly handled and trained are not balky, neither do they have had habits. When-horses with had babits are encountered a careful study of each case should be made in order to ascertain the cause, and, if possible, to remove it.

The most common cause of balkiness among horses is punishment to make them do something that they cannot do or that they do not understand how to do. Another common cause is the forcing of morses to draw heavy loads without allowing them ,to stop occasionally to rest and regain their breath. The use of the whip or spur in such instances should be avoided, as the pain inflicted will be very likely to provoke further and more stubborn rebellion. If a horse balks the bearing of the harness should be examined to see if it is hurting him. If a heavy load is being drawn and the horse is not allowed to rest and regain his breath and strength he may become sulky and refuse to-pull. Give him a short rest, and while he is resting rub his nose, pick up a front foot and tap the hoof a few times, or adjust the harness, and he may forget his grievance. Take the lines and give the command to go ahead, turning slightly to the right or left to start. If the horse does not start it is either a case of overload orsa chronic balker. If the load is so heavy it cannot be drawn, unload. If the horse is a chronic halker a course of training will be necessary to overcome the habit.

In older horses where the habit of balking is fixed the horse should be trained to obey all commands with promptness without being hitched to the wagon. First put on the double trip ropes and use them until the herse stops and stands when he hears "whoa." Next put on the guy line, which should be managed by an assistant, while you'drive and attend the trip ropes. " The guy line is a rope instened around the horse's neck and






