There are $22,000,000$ children in this army. In just a few years these $22,000,000$ children will be the men and women of this nation. They are the boys and girls who are to take our places just ás soon as we drop out, and we are dropping out every cay. The world is calling them. The earth, the air, the sea, is calling them. The future holds more for our boys and our girls than we will ever know or see, and they ought to be prepared for the day in which they are to live and serve humanity, but they are not. A few, but oh, such a few, are receiving any training for the great world work that is calling them, while the very great majority are possibilities without any training for anythng. <br> And herein is the most dangerous revolution our nation has ever known. The fact that the children of today actually refuse to be educated is one of the reddest flags floating over our nation. It means more suffering, more sorrow, more loss in every way than anything else that is going on. It means loss of time, loss of money, loss of energy, and loss of life, to the future of our country. The greatest drawback to our country today is IGNORANCE, and we are multiplying it every day. Most of our suffering, most of our unhappiness, most of our poverty and crime today tre the results of an untrained, uneducated citizenship. What is the natter? Why do our children nearly all drop out of our free schools before they reach the end of the seventh grade? <br> There is no effect without a cause. There is a reason for this unnatural fact. It is as natural for children to learn as it is for them to grow, if the environment is normal. Children love to learn until learning is made unnatural. It is as natiral for the mind to develop as the body. It is more natural, because the body has just so many years to grow and then its growth ceases. But there is no limit to the development of the mind. Our Creator surely intended it to grow on forever. And if it gets a good start it will do it. There are many examples of this in our own acquaintance and yours. The well educated man or woman is always looking for something more to learn, but the man or woman who has never | gone to school at all sometimes seems to feel that it is a kind of a disgrace to try to learn anything new. This idea is one of the greatest stumbling blocks in the progress of our nation. And a lot of folks reach the point where they do not need to know anything. Here is one of our silent causes for this great educational revolt and revolution. As a rule such folks think their children do not need to know anything, either. So, instead of building schools to fit the needs of the citizens of the future, we just let them go and a little later the same tax payers build an addition to the poor house, or the penitentiary for them. <br> Before anybody can put an end to anything they must discover the cause and eliminate the cause. And we believe the cause of our educational revolution is-our present school system does not fit the needs of the children of our country. <br> "Oh, but," says some of our great classic educators,"we are losing sight of the ideal and the beautiful. We are drifting into nothing but industrial education." In Heaven's name, how can you lose an ideal, nutil you have one to lose? How can you write poetry or a great thesis on the classic things of life until you know how to spell and compose a few sentences correctly? And how can-you hope to do this until you have at least finished the seventh grade in cur public schools? And should you discover there is a germ of talent in you and you did not have a bank account to keep you going, how would you ever find a way to develop that germ? It takes means to reach any end. And if you do not happen to be born with means and talent, too, then a way must be made to develop that talent. <br> We are not talking about classic education. We are not talking about the fine artss. Of course, they are necessary. We all want them. But why are there no more artists in our country? Because only five or six of our American children ever get past the seventh grade in school and only one in every three hundred ever gets as far ajong as the end of the free high school. How many artists of every kind do you suppose are lost to the world in the 299 American children that never have an ideal aroused in them until it is too late for them to go back and make their lives over? And just how many of the ONE in every three hundred are |
