Both are believed to be closed temporarily only, and officials of each said they were solvent. The closing of the Farmers and Merchants Bank followed a sudden demand ot depositors for their money in the flist two hours today. A few hours ofter the doors were closed it was said, a large shipment of cash was received. <br> Bank Examiner Sneed is in charge of both institutions. With Bert Jay, a prominent Clairemont ranchman, McCombs was driving cattle across a pasture near Clairemont when a severe electrical storm came up McCombs and his horse were killed and Jay was severly shocked, but recovered. <br> Carter J. He was using a lantern for light, which was standing four or five feet from the car, when the gasoline in the tank became ignited. In a moment he was enveloped in flames. He was so badly burned he only lived five days in the South Side Hospital at Mesa, Ariz. He was 27 years of age, having been born in Taylor county, Texas, in 1894. He came to this section nearly three years ago and had made lots of friends during his short stay. W. W. leaders, saying he would leave Moscow en suly 12 and would surrender to the Federal authorities as soon as be landed in this country. <br> Haywood's sentence was twenty years in the Federal penitentiary. He was released on bond pending appeal to the Supreme court. The Supreme Court refused to review the ces on April 11 last, and later it beclame known that Haywood was in Russia. <br> It was then ascertained that he had sailed from New York April 1, eleven days prior to the Supreme Court's ruling. His attorneys announced he went to Russia to attend the international trade council and on a personal mission. <br> Later it was reported he had gone at the solicitation of Nikolal Lenin to become head of he Soviet propaganda bureau. <br> Twenty 1.
