R. BUCHANAN <br> RELATIVE TO SCHOOL BONDS <br> Mr. A. Johnston, <br> Enyder, Texas. <br> Dear Sir and Friend: <br> I have your letter of the 20 th relative to the outlook for the sale of the Snyder bonds to the state School Board, and replying will say that 1 have had a talk with the bond clerk in this department who is really the fellow that knows more about the outlook than any member of the board because he is the fellow who keeps the bond records. This man tells me that the outlook for the board to make any mory purchases in the next several months is very unpromiisng. <br> The record for a number of years past has been that the receipts to the credit of the permanent school fund have run from one hundred fifty thousand to two hundred thousand dollars per month; hence the Board figured that eight or ten months after it purchased that two million dollars worth of bonds' on the instal' ment plan last March or April, the receipts to the credit of that fund would be sufficient to liquidate all of the indebtedness for such purchases, but the record is, since said purchases ;were made, that not more than thirty to forty thousand dollars per month has been coming in. It seems that very little land is being patented and very little principal is being paid on the bonds that the school fund holds. Of course it is hard to tell how long this record on receipts is going to hold out. It may be that receipts will legin to increase pretty soon and that next Spring at or before the time school closes, the board will be in position to take the Snyder bonds. However my advice would be that if you can find a sale for the bonds in the open market at par and accrued interest to be sure to let them go, and I think it would be well to make ef. | forts to find a purchaser, for the reason that the State Board might take Tie installment route on the next purchases they make, and might not be able to pay the money as fast as you would need it when you began the construction of a new building. <br> Be sure to write me when I can be of any service to you. <br> Very cordially yours, <br> C.
