





One can well imagine how such a growth woul dafect the mail service, with its facilities never quite adequate and almost at a standsti'l during the period of the war. As a realt of this condition serious consideration must be given to providing additional buildings in the leading postal centers for the specific purpose of handling parcel post packages.

In order to prevent any delay to other classes of mail, such as letters, it has been suggested that parce! post be handled separately from other cases of mail in the congested transportation routes. This involves great expenditures of money for build ings and equipment, and with the great burden of debt on the government, which must be considered, the solution of this particular problem becomes doubly difficult. It is being approached, however, from every angle, and it is proposed, as rapidly as possible to meet the conditions without too great a tax upon the public
