She is survived by nineteen grand children and twenty one great grand children.

Mrs. Keirsey was one of Texas' pioneers, having moved from Missourit to Dallas county with her husband in 1865, just after the Civil War, and later moving to what is now the town of Sherman in 1866. Following the death of her husband son G. W. Keirsey of Sherman but son G. W. Kirsey of Sherman but for the past few years she spent most of her time in Amarillo.

Mrs. Keirsey lived a consecrated Christian life, having been a member of the Missionary Baptist church for over sixty-five years. Her father was one of the first ministers to preach in Johnson county, Texas. Early in life she enlisted in the cause of her savior and has consistently followed him throughout her life. She was a member of the First Baptist church of Amarillo.
