



### "Before | Die."

To endow "before I die some sort of green place where little street urchins could play cricket, all accessories provided," was one of the dreams of Herbert Jenkins, London publisher. He began life at fifteen in a bookseller's shop. He and another boy used to sit up half the night devouring books. That boy was the poet, John Masefield. Walking to save a penny omnibus fare, refusing an invitation to a river picnic because of a sixpenny railroad fare, lunching on a bun-this is the picture of his early twenties, as he many times described it. In 1911, when he was about 36, his "Life of George Borrow" first brought him into public view. He has just died after building up a great publishing business.

Old-Age Relief in Alaska. Alaska has an old-age pension system which includes a home for the aged, indigent Alaskans. It disburses monthly pensions of \$12.50 to men and \$25 to women without cost of administration, and maintains its home with only two salaried officials, a superintendent, who draws \$3.000 annually, and a secretary, on a nominal salary of \$50 per month. The supervision over pensions and the home is carried out by a non-salaried board of trustees, of which the governor is chairman
