





This principle, so rooted and grounded in the history and operation of our great Republic, may be briefly stated in the following language:

Government is the prescribing and enforcement of regulations of conduct by and through and in accord- 13 ance with the intelligent will of those to be bound thereby. It was concretely expressed in the Declaration of Independence as follows:

"All government derives its just powers from the consent of the governed.'

This brings to a discussion of how this consent of the governed may be justly obtained, and how this popular will may be intelligently expressed, or, in other words, what relation the ballot bears to American civili-

First—Universal in its application. In the first place, in order to be a just expression of popular will, it must apply to all classes who have ob tained membership in the society to be governed so far as their capabilities of self-government will permit. Thus the ballot is extended to all classes of citizens, regardless of race, color or previous condition of servitude, or of religious belief, social standing or financial worth. An enlightened public opinion alone will sustain such a system. George Washington, the Father of our Country, said, that a general diffusion of knowledge is essential to the perpetuity of a free people. The reason for that declaration is that unless the person registering with his ballot the public will is intelligent, his ballot ceases to be the expression of a freeman, but becomes the vehicle for political "bossism," and corruption to thwart the intelligent public will. Hence safeguarding limitations are thrown around the ballot by law. Only adults are allowed to vote. Citizenship, of course, is required, though long deferred in Texas, for certainly the government of any society should be limited to its own membership. Certain educational qualifications are required, such as to be able to read and write, and speak the English language. The requirements in this respect, however, in Texas, have been greviously low in the past, and Texas has suffered accordingly, for without some |. knowledge of our constitution and form of government, and the method of operation of our public and governmental institutions, a person cannot register intelligent will regarding our public welfare. Yet, under our loose regulations in this respect in the past, persons have voted, who, under the law were entitled to cast their ballots, but who were as ignorant of the theory and operation of our government as the Hotentots of Africa. Corrupt politicians have dealt in this ignorant and purchasable vote, and, no doubt, many times the intelligent public will has thus been defeated. 
