





# The Grasshoppers Are Here

Grasshoppers have already appeared in in some sections of our county, and unless we make preparations before they become too numerus, our crops are likely to be very much damaged.

In order to be fully prepared to combat this nuisance, we again suggest that every farmer secure the proper ingredients for spreading poison to kill them. The most efficient means to guard against the destruction of our crops has been found by experiments to be the following formula:

> Wheat Bran \_\_\_\_\_25 lbs. White Arsenic \_\_\_\_\_1 lb. Six Lemons Low Grade Molasses\_\_\_\_2 qts. Water \_\_\_\_\_ 2 gallons

Mix the bran and poison dry. Dilute the molasses with the amount of water named and squeeze in the lemons. Now mix the liquid thoroughly with the poison bran mixture. After an even mixture has been obtained add more water and mix until a mash is obtained so that after being squeezed in the hand it readily falls apart. Poison should be put out early in the morning or late in the evening. Splendid results have been obtained by plowing a deep furrow around the field next to the pasture fence. The poison can be scattered effectively along this furrow.





Mix the bran and poison thoroughly while dry. Dilute the molasses with the amount of water as named. Squeeze the lemon juice into this diluted molasses, then grind the rind . and add this also to the liquid. Now mix the liquid thoroughly with the poison bran mixture. After an even mixture has been obtained, add more water and mix, until a mash is obtained so that after being squeezed in the hand, it readily falls apart. of the lemons with a meat chopper the hand, it readily falls apart.

Grasshoppers feed in the morning, and as the bait loses its attractiveness when dry, it should be applied so as to be as moist as possible at this time. It will therefore be best to put it out about sunrise. Provided the ground is not so hot and dry as to remove the moisture during the night, it may be put out late in the evening in case the area to be treatevening in case the area to be treated is too extensive to be quickly covered in early morning. The mixture should be scattered, as if sowing seed, by hand, or any type of seeder capable of distributing it. The amount given in the formula should cover about five acres.

Where the hoppers have become distributed over the cultivated field the entire area should be sown, and the application repeated in a few days if necessary. If the hoppers are found to be advancing from pasture lands, distribute the mash in front of their line of march for a distance of a couple of hundred yards, keeping also the margin of the pasture land


