



INFORMATION SOUTHERN METHODIST UNIVERSITY DALLAS, Tex., June 4 .- "With an increase in the student body of 20 per cent, the greatest in the history of the school; with an enlarged fac-

ulty and an expended program of education, there are many reasons to justify the confident expectation that Southern Methodist University will soon become one of the greatest educational institutions of the Southwest," said President Charles C. Selecman in summing up the work of the present school year. The total enrollment this year was 2,425, in-

cluding 1,295 boys and 1,130 girls.

Achievements of the year include completion of the second million dollar endowment fund. Important gifts for buildings include \$100,000 from R. Harper and Annie Kirby of Austin for a building for the School of Theology and \$300,000 from Mr. and Mrs. R. M. McFarlin of San Antonio for an auditorium to seat 3,500. The theological building is nearing completion. Plans are now being made for the auditorium and it is expected school year. Another incident of major importance is the establishment of the George F. and Ora Nixon Arnold foundation to endow with \$120,-000 a chair of American Statesmanship at Southern Methodist University, announced January 1, 1924. The announced purpose was the training of leaders who would lend their influence toward perpetuating long established and well-tried American institutions of government.

In athletics, S. M. U. won the Southwestern football, golf championship and third place in tennis. In debates, S. M. U. students won five out of seven. In poetry, S. M. U. students took first and third prizes in a national contest participated in by students of seventy-two universities and colleges.

New prizes offered students during the year included: Best woman debater, \$25, won by Miss Margaret Pilley of Mineral Wells; sophomore doing best work in the school of commerce, \$25, won by Meyer Romotsky of Dallas; best originality and scholarship in English, \$25, won by George Bond of Hillsboro; best news or feature story, \$25, won by Robert L. Johnson of Orange California; best student in Latin or Greek, \$100, not yet awarded; highest scholarship average made by a boy student, \$100, not yet awarded; best series of sales letters by a member of the salesmanship class of the school of commerce, Newman medal, not yet awarded.




