What is the cause of war-is put forward in the above editorial from the pen of the Cheneys. Why do men fight and kill in time of peace? Why are homes wrecked and men and is, that sin is at the bottom of it all. "Righteousness exalteth a nation, sin is a reproach ot any people." The nation that lives rigthoeusly will live peaceably one with the other. The individual that lives righteously in this life will be at peace with all mankind. Nations are made up with individuals, and reflects individual life. As men live so will their nations be.

As to the other phase of the inquiry, "The need of vocational training," there is no room for argument People should be better trained i the various vocations that they are engaged in. People should be no only taught the better way to make living, but that labor is necessar and important. In labor is found true happiness. No man is more hap pier or contented than when engaged in some honest occupation. The trouble with the world today is tha there are too many people living of the other man. Fully half of the people are parasites on society-living off the other man's labor. The Divine injunction to man is to make bread by the sweat of thy face. The chief occupation of many is to work the other fellow.

The teaching of war for the 6,000 years has not improved the world in any regard. If the past six thousand years had been devoted to the wholesome teaching, "love thy neighbor as thyself," we would long ago have past the point of a possibility of national or international misunderstanding and wars. If the past 6,000 years had been devoted to vocational training-to work of some kind and the better way to work the world would have been much better served. The man that does not study the better way of farming does not make progress, on the other hand, the man that has studied the improved methods of farming and other vocations are the ones that has forged ahead in their various callings.

"And what do you think will bring peace to the whole world?" The answer to this quiry is, wholesome labor, honestly followed—the employ-ment of mind and body. Added to this is a constant fear of God and honest efforts put forward in keep-ing his commands. "Let us reach the conclusion of the whole matter," says Solomon, "The whole duty of man is to fear God and keep His commandments.'

I Those with valuable lands have deeds of title to them, but everyone of us has possessions that are dearer to us than lands or money. These are man's inalienable right to freedom of speech, and freedom of conscience, the right of peaceable assembly, the sanctity of the home; cherished rights given to every American citizen. Everyone of us has a definite and recognized deed of title to these rights, and that deed of title is the Constitution of the United States of America.

The citizens of many countries do not have these rights much less a recognized title to them. In Russia the government can invade the sanctity of the home, and pronounce the sentence of death without trial. In many Asiatic countries men are not even recognized as free and equally due these rights.

The Constitution has been proclaimed the greatest document of its kind. Besides its present importance to every American citizen, it merits this praise for two reasons: first because of the historic setting woven about it, and second because of its content an individual merits of its composition.

South Texas lands were worth as much to the Americans as it was to the Bohemians and Germans, but the American people have always been sellers and when the foreigners came along and offered them good prices for their land they could not withstand

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


Cotton growers in the El Paso Valley, which last year led the United States in production, number of acres considered, will compete for \$3,000 in cash prizes offered by the Dallas News, the Bankers' Association of Texas, and S. W. King, cotton broker of Dallas, for the largest yield on five acres. One of the entrants is Charles King, Jr., of San Jose, who made two bales on an acre of land in 1923, when he was one of the prize winners in El Paso County contest. Several other boys, who made large crops in 1923, are expected to enter the contest.

Oil development in the Panhandle of Texas is making rapid progress recently. Producing wells have been! brought in and steps are taken to get the oil to market. A six-inch pipe line thirty miles in length now is under construction from the oil fields into Amarillo. Another pipe line, eighteen miles long, is under construction from the oil fields to Panhandle. Loading racks have been completed on a forty-acre tract adjoining the Santa Fe Railway at Panhandle. The line to Amarillo will be completed by July 1, and the Panhandle line much earlier. A refinery is located at Amarillo.

Over 900 new farmers located on the Rio Grande irrigation project in the Rincon and Mesilla Valleys in New Mexico and the El Paso Valley in Texas this year, according to L. M. Lawson, manager of the project.





AUSTIN, Texas, July 23 .- An ac-

"It cannot fail to be harmful," said Dr. Udden, "to spread the opinion that the taxes in the State of Texas even will be lightened by oil royalties from this field. Under the present conditions it is certainly premature, and unwise, to formulate any policies for financing the University from such an uncertain source. It is even possible that such royalties coming for a few years during the production of this field might prove to do harm to the University, which should have a steady income independent of the production of oil, cotton or of beef. No great university can ever be built upon a less certain foundation than a steady income that can be figured on for many years ahead. Such was evidently the intention of the wise men who put aside lands for the building of a great university in this State.'
