Looking Into Good Roads Scurry Co.

Last Friday afternoon a committee of 19 citizens left Snyder in autemobiles to inspect the roads in the and from here to Ira. The committee was accompanied by E. I. Thompson, president and general manager of the Loutex Corporation. Judge Trace Holley represented the Com-missioners Court in the inspection. The first stop was made at the Moore well on the other side of Ira. There we found Mr. Lechner who joined us on the inspection of the road and I e well at Humphreys-Wellborne. On the way to Ira attention was called to a number of culverts and bridges that needed repairing. Some of the culverts needs replacing with Lucks over same which are loaded with pipe and other heavy material.

The road from Snyder to Ira is in good shape other than bridges and culvert repairing. From Snyder to The Moore well the road is bad and needs grading. Much trucking of oil and material is done over this road. From the Moore well to the Humphreys well, about two or three miles the road lies through the Lhinery and is the worst imaginable. A car has to pull practically all the way in low or intermediate. In erecting the rig and hauling pipe to the Humphreys trucks brought material to Ira and there it was unloaded and placed on wagons and hauled to the well. This necessitated extra expense on the part of the oil promoters. Prospectors and visitors are U. S. Ser pandicapped in getting to and from 1 the Humphreys field.

It is proposed to grade the road up in good shape from Ira to the Governor Moore well and go west from Ira beyond the cemetery, then turn south and go through the Cub Murphy field to the shinery. A road through the shinery could be graded at a mimimum cost. The way they build shinery roads is first to scoop out the sand and then throw up the clay, Heaving a ditch on each side for drainage and to catch the blowing sand. river a well is going down on the Lechner. 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



Agency Nearest Local Churches WIN Be Employed in Bringing About Fuller Development in Future

Indicating the objects to which the money collected on the Baptist 75 Campaign goes, the headquarters of that movement in Nashville has issued the following statement of the distribution of the \$53, 377,084.43, representing the revised figures on the sum collected on that movement up to May 1, 1924: Foreign missions \$9,898,830.30; home missions \$5,757,820.09; state and associational missions \$9,093,769.27; Christian edu, cation \$14,849,083.51; hospitals \$2, 672,692.43; orphanages \$4,464.965.87; ministerial relief \$1,570,356.94; expenses and fixed charges not other wise absorbed \$2,091,608.56; special credits and miscellaneous items \$1,-590,990.47; purchase and operation of state denominational papers \$62, 200.38; foreign relief \$67,602.16; undistributed balance \$152,330.77; Home Mission Board specials \$15,340; Forraised by churches on foreign fields and expended by them in work there \$1,003,390.68.

All Work Goes Forward

Every department of the general missionary, educational and benevo-Jent work fostered by Southern Baptists has been greatly enlarged and strengthened by the campaign, it is reported, while a suggestion of the development that has come in the activities and liberality of the local churches as a result of this forward movement is furnished in the following statement of progress along general lines, furnished by the headquarters office:

Comparing the growth of the deeding the Campaign with the five years since that program was pro-dected it is shown that during the last five years the following advances were recorded over the previous cor-responding period: 1562 more new churches organized, a gain of 229 per cent; 241,966 more new members gained, an advance of 66 per cent; 209,002 more baptisms administered, a gain of 27 per cent; 1,603 more new Sunday schools organized, a gain of 118 per cent; 354,727 more new Sunday school pupils enrolled, a gain of 132 per cent; \$35,086,970.83 more reported in gifts to missions and benevolences, a gain of 187 per cent; \$51,153,873.88 more noted in gifts to local church purposes, a gain of 95 per cent; \$84,417,361.55 more reported in gifts to all causes, a gain of 117 per cent; and \$57,147,004 advance shown in the value of local church property, a gain of 81 per

Complete Collections Now In the hope of completing the collection of all Campaign subscriptions by the close of this year and securing cash offerings from those Bap-tists who did not subscribe to the five-year program an intensive effort during the remainder of the summer and fall will be waged throughout the South under the general leader ship of Dr. L. R. Scarborough, general director, with the co-operation of the various state mission offices and the officers and workers in the nearly 1,000 district associations. 

STATE CONTROL OF MOTOR VE-HICLE COMMON CARRIERS-A PROTECTION TO THE INDUSTRY.

tion cost. The regulation and control of the Signal office. traffic has a direct bearing on the financing and constructing of the highway. When the construction of a highway is contemplated, the first question the engineer asks is, what is the present and probable future traffic over this road, and what is the nature of this traffic?" If the traffic is mostly passenger cars that use the highway in the ordinary way, then he works out plans and specifications for a road of a type adequate to carry this traffic. If the ttraffic includes heavy trucks and fast moving busses then the engineer must draw his plans accordingly.

The original investment in a road that will accommodate the traffic in the first case is usually about one half the investment in a road that will carry the traffic in the latter case, and the maintenance of the road in the latter case is far in excess of that in the first case. It will readily be seen that many more miles of road of a type that will accommo date probably 95 per cent of the traffic could be constructed, than of a type that will accommodate all the traffic. The question then arises-Why not classify and regulate the heavy traffic-so as to restrict it to the roads constructed to carry such traffic? Or should we build all roads of a type that will accommoer miles can be constructed, fewer people will be served by good roads, the longer it will take to connect up our highway system and the greater our investment in them, consequently the heavier our tax burden. Thus we see the relation traffic control and regulation has to the financing and construction of highways. These are questions which should receive the most careful consideration of our legislators.

The phase of traffic control I will attempt to discuss in this article is "State control of Motor vehicle common carriers as a pretection to the indsutry."

The motor vehicle common carrier has become an every-day necessity, and its quick and pliable service is responsible for its popularity. But, in spite of its advantages over rail servrce, it is losing its prestige with the public, on account of the great number of irresponsible operators of motor vehicle common carriers-and the lack of stability and responsibility in the service. At the present time in Texas, any person, regardless of character or responsibility, who can raise the first payment on a secondhand Ford can enter the transportation field in competition to the reliable and responsible operator who has invested in expensive equipment, to accommodate the public and who operates on regular schedule, with financial backing to protect the publie against loss of property or life. These irresponsible persons operate unbonded and unregulated over the public highways constructed and maintained by public tax money, in competition not only to the responsible operator, but in competition to the railroads and electric railways who build and maintain their own tracks and pay taxes to build the road for their competitor to operate over. The people in many communities are beginning to realize that more people are inconvenienced by wornout roads than are convenienced by truck service. They are beginning to realize that neither lives nor property will be protected by many of the present motor vehicle common carriers. They are placing their lives and property in the hands of a person against whom a judgment for loss of property or life on account of carelessness or on account of defective equipment would not be worth the paper it was written on-in other words they pay the transportation cost and carry their own insur-

This sentiment will ripen into hostility toward the industry and harsh demands will be made through the Legislature unless steps are taken soon to regulate motor vehicle common carriers, and place them on an equal basis with existing transportation agencis.


