



A hearing shall be given to the owners of property abutting upon said portions of streets, and to the owners of railways using, occupying or crossing said portions of streets, and to all other interested, whether they be named herein or not, all of whom are hereby notified to be and appear at the time and place herein named and fixed, which said hearing shall be held on the 24th day of February, 1925, at 10 o'clock A. M., in the City Hall of the City of Snyder, Texas, and which shall be continued from time to time and from day to day if necessary until all desiring to be heard shall have been fully and fairly heard, and at which hearing any mistake, irregularity or invalidity in any of the proceedings with reference to the making of the said improvements or assessments therefor may be corrected, and the benefits by means of the said improvements and all sums to be assessed against abutting property and the owners thereof will be determined and the apportionment of the cost of the improvements in each district will be made and all other matters and things required by law and the proceedings of the City will be done; and after all desiring and presenting themselves to be heard, either in person or by agents, attorneys or representatives, have been fully and fairly heard the said hearing will be closed and assessments will be alosed. be closed, and assessments will by ordinance and in accordance with law and the proceedings of the City be levied against the said abutting property owners thereof, and against railways and owners thereof, whether such owners be named herein or not; and at said hearing any person, firm or corporation, their agents, representatives or attorneys, and any and all others in any wise interested shall have the right to appear and be heard, and to introduce evidence and subpoena witnesses.

The City Secretary of the City of Snyder is directed to give notice to the owners of the property abutting upon the said portions of streets. and to the owners of railways using, occupying or crossing said portions of streets, and to all others interested, of all said matters and things, by causing a copy of this ordinance to be published at least three times in some newspaper of general circulation in and published in the City of Snyder, Texas, the first publication to be made at least ten days before the date above fixed for such hearing. The City Secretary may also give notice by mailing to each owner at his or her address, if known, letter, a copy of said notice, but the said notice by letter shall be only cumulative of the said notice by advertisement and publication and the notice by advertisements and publication shall in all casse be sufficient, whether or not any other notice be given.

The fact that the improvements herein provided for are being delayed pending the taking effect of this ordinance, and the condition of said streets and public places herein ordered improved endangers public health and safety, constitutes and creates an urgent public necessity requiring that the rule providing that ordinances shall be read at more than one meeting, or more than one time, be suspended, and requiring that this ordinance be passed and take effect as an emergency measure, and such rules are accordingly suspended and this ordinance is passed as an emergency measure, and shall be in force and effect immediately from and after its passage.
