

## Muleshoe preping for Friona fracas

Coaches like to leave the rivalry to the players.

"The kids would rather play Friona than anybody," Muleshoe head coach David Wood said. "But it always comes down to who hits the hardest. Once the game starts, all the hype goes out the window. The important thing is not to lose focus."

The testosterone and adrenaline will be flowing when Muleshoe hosts Friona in a District 1-3A game at 7:30 p.m. Friday at Benny Douglass Stadium.

"For the teams, schools and towns, the rivalry will always be the thing," Friona head coach James Morton said. "It's good for our program. Me personally, I'm just trying to take care of getting us ready to play the game."

The series has been lopsided lately, with Friona winning 34-14 last year and 41-6 in 1995.

"Anytime there's a rivalry and one team dominates, it's always about respect."

The game takes on greater significance this year as Muleshoe (2-3 overall, 1-1 in district) tries to prove it is a playoff contender.

The Mules snapped a three-game losing streak with a 15-6 win last week at Dalhart and is

much improved, according to Morton.

"We're wary of Muleshoe," Morton said. "They've got some confidence going into the game, and the longer they stay in the game, the more their confidence will build."

Friona (5-0, 2-0) is ranked No. 7 in state and is the prohibitive district favorite after beating River Road 33-20 last week.

Friona led 27-0 at halftime, but needed two Wildcat turnovers and a 22-yard touchdown run by Matthew Kendrick in the fourth to hold on for its 14th-straight regular-season win.

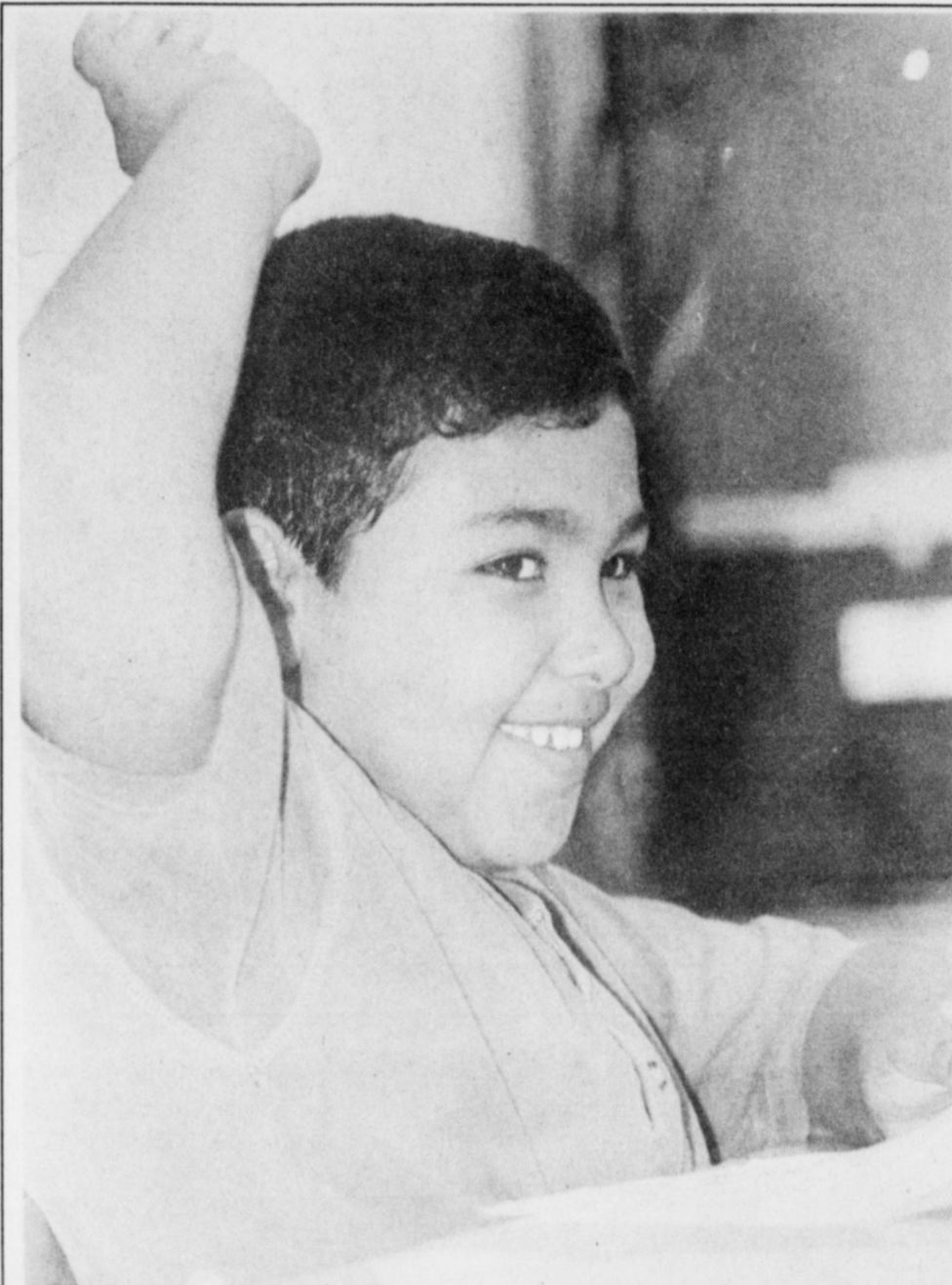
"We've been inconsistent and I don't think we've played a complete game yet on both sides of the ball."

"We are getting better," Morton said. "The offense line gained some confidence against River Road. River Road is big and physical and we were able to get after them."

Friona's wishbone offense averages 34 points and nearly 400 yards a game.

The Mules are second in the district in team defense, allowing 223 yards a game, but Wood said Friona is hard to prepare for because you can't rely on tendencies.

President Trent Black called the meeting to order, Vice President Amanda Cowart called roll and Secretary Hillary Tipps read the minutes from the two previous meetings.

As the meeting progressed, members actively moved to approve and seconded various reports and plans, shared ideas for the future and openly offered opinions.

The Board of Directors seemed more like a meeting of corporate big-wigs brainstorming how to make their next million, rather than third, fourth and fifth-grade students deciding on the fate of Muleville, USA.

Muleville is a small community within DeShazo Elementary consisting of a school store, managed by the fifth grade, a "real" bank run by the fourth grade with the help and support of Muleshoe State Bank, and a post office manned by third graders.

## Local preacher backs Promise Keepers movement

Thousands of Christian men encroached upon Washington last weekend, with no hidden political agenda, just coming together for spiritual renewal.

Men crowded into National Mall, singing the Lord's praises, asking forgiveness and pledging to honor seven promises that will enable them to become better fathers, husbands, friends and churchmen.

The revival, which is said to have been

the largest religious gathering ever, was organized by Promise Keepers, a non-denominational ministry of men.

Brad Reeves, pastor of United Methodist Church, Muleshoe, who has attended two Promise Keepers rallies in the past said, "They can be very uplifting. If they can keep the seven promises, it would be beneficial to everyone, not just men."

Bill McCartney, the founder of the Promise Keepers, explained why his ministry focuses primarily on men.

"Men have been irresponsible; men have not stood strong for their convictions; men have not been men of their word. The reason we see a downward spiral in morality in this nation is because the men of God have not stood together."

Reeves, who considers himself pro-Promise Keepers, said that McCartney is unique because he does not want people to focus on what others are doing, the sins

#### Almanac: mild winter ahead

Texas and Oklahoma can expect temperatures in November through March to be about one degree warmer than normal in the northwest, according to The Old Farmer's 1998 Almanac.

Precipitation will be near normal, with a drier-than usual November and March, but wetter weather in between.

## Federal officials raising stink over hauling fertilizers

WASHINGTON, D.C.—U.S. Rep. Larry Combest of Lubbock said although a federal agency has only briefly delayed the burden of requiring shipping papers and warning signs for farm pickup trucks hauling fertilizer from the farm supply store, he will push for states to retain their legal authority to exempt the routine transport of commonly-used agricultural chemicals.

Last week, the U.S. Department of Transportation announced a one-year delay on Oct. 1 regulations requiring farmers to post warning placards, shipping papers and emergency procedures that were previously only required of hazardous cargo shipments. Although states have had a 15-year record of successfully making their own guidelines and exemptions for farmers hauling fertilizer and other farm applications, the Transportation Department will insist on warning signs and excessive paperwork each time a farmer brings supplies back from town, Combest said.

The Republican Congressman has endorsed legislation reinstating the common sense exemption granted by states.

"For the few times out of a year that farmers move fertilizer and other inputs from the supply store back to the farm, the federal government wants warning

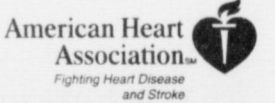

"Muleville USA provides students a fun way to learn life skills," said fifth-grader Amanda Lopez.

On the basic side, students learn how to make purchases, make bank deposits, write checks, reconcile their checkbook, which can be a big job for some adults, and mail letters.

But things do get much more complex within the small community. Student workers must learn customer service skills, learn to give change, and most importantly, learn to work together.

"The workers are learning to be more responsible," said fourth-grader Hillary Tipps, who as secretary is learning how to take minutes and sharpening her public speaking skills each time she reads a reports in front of her peers.

"We learn how to run a business by interviewing people, making advertisements, organizing everything, and we have to make sure workers are there on time," said fifth-grader Barry Morris.

"We also have to learn how to generate ideas to increase business, like getting people to mail more letters," said Joshua Norman, who as one of the regulating officers of the post office has decided to reward the homeroom that mails the most letters, of course addressed correctly, each week.

The post office is not the only service trying to increase participation. The bank re-

ceived approval from the Board Monday to give away souvenir paper footballs signed by Muleshoe High School Varsity football players for each deposit made.

In other business Monday, the board had a heated discussion about hosting the concession stands at two spring UIL events. Members discussed the possible profit margin and tentatively agreed on the types of food to be served.

The board then unanimously approved to propose the idea to their parents who will make the deciding vote since their participation will be vital to the fund-raiser.

Whereas the most a weaner chicken can hope for is Colonel.

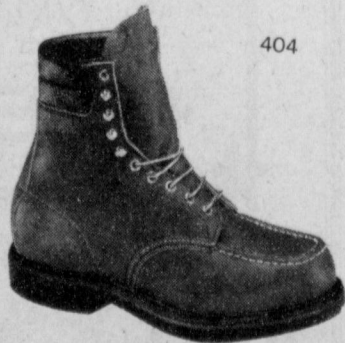

signs posted all around their pickup truck and trailer and paperwork designed only to make a bureaucrat happy," said Combest. "Just when I think I have heard it all when it comes to stupid regulations, a new one like this comes along. States have a good safety record in setting guidelines and recognizing a farmer's short haul of fertilizer is a far cry from a huge truckload of hazardous cargo."

Congressman Combest has

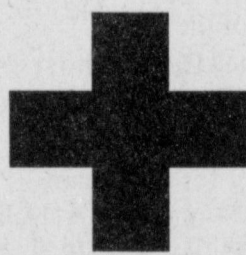
co-sponsored a provision returning the right of states to provide exceptions from federal placards, shipping papers and emergency procedures for pickups carrying routine farm chemicals. Combest said he expects states to regain their exemption authority before the Transportation Department's one-day delay in its new rule. HM 200 expires. Only farm-to-farm or farm-to-field movement of agricultural chemicals is still allowed without regulations.

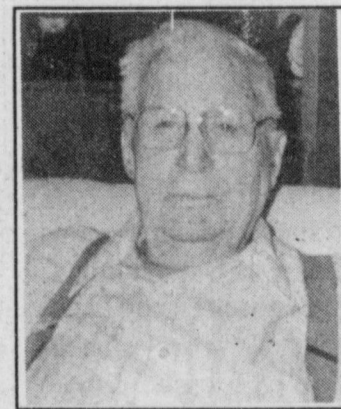

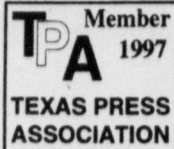

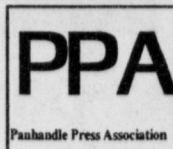

## Early touchdown jumpstarts Mules

DALHART — The focus all week was on making things happen.

Muleshoe got instant results in Friday's 15-6 District 1-3A win against Dalhart.

Carlton Lewis caught a 20-yard touchdown pass one play after a Dalhart fumble, giving Muleshoe a 6-0 lead 53 seconds into the game.

"From there on out the kids knew they were going to win the game," Muleshoe head coach David Wood. "There was just something about them after that."

Muleshoe (2-3 overall, 1-1 in district) snapped a three-game losing streak despite 135 yards in penalties and four turnovers.

"We could have had 500 yards of offense if we hadn't stopped ourselves," Wood said. "We did a great job of keeping our heads in the game in the whole game... except for the little things."

Greg Pena led a bruising ground game with 123 yards on 23 carries as Muleshoe finished with 310 yards.

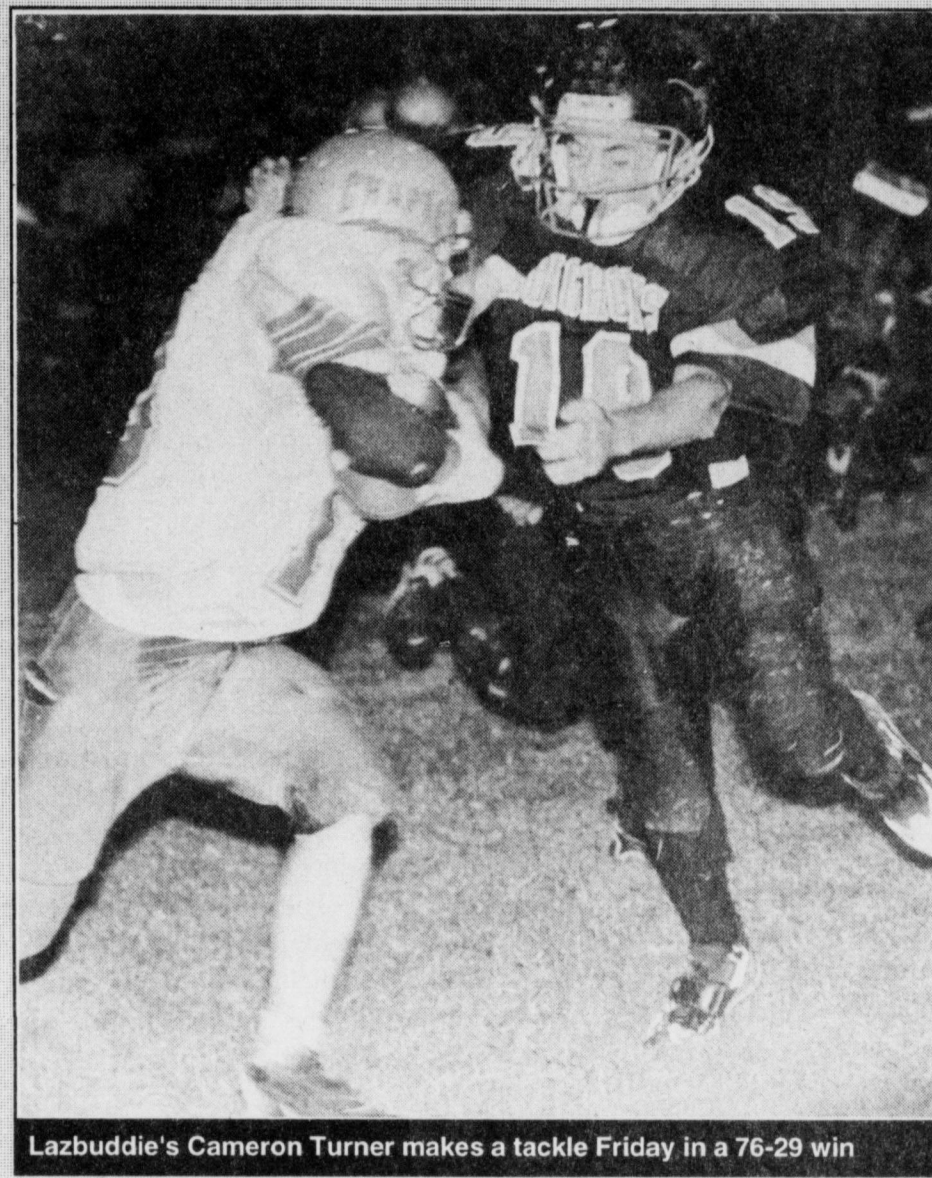
Meanwhile, the district's second-ranked defense completely shut down Dalhart (1-4, 1-2) until the final drive of the game.

The Mules limited the Golden Wolves to 176 yards and forced six turnovers. The Mules also got a safety on Aaron Purdy's third-quarter sack.

Nearly half of the yards came during an 80-yard scoring drive late in the game with Muleshoe protecting a 15-0 lead.
