
The subject af this sketch first saw the light of day in Denton county, Texas, in 1891. He came to Scurry county with his parents in 1899, locating at Ira. It was while following old Beck up and down the cotton rows that he foresaw the great future and the latent possibilities of Scurry couny. Accordingly, he invested some of his first earnings in Scurry county land.

After traveling all over the United States, in 1919, he married Miss Louise Smith of Tennessee, and located in Snyder. For about four years he was actively engaged in buying and selling Scurry county land, it having been often said of him that he handled more land and was responsible for more good farmers buying land in Scurry county than any other two men in the county, "I never in my life insisted on anyone buying land that i knew he could not ma living on by cultivating it," Mr. Taylor said to a Times-Signal representative Thursday. This policy not only brought to Scurry county men who prospered, but it also brought to Mr. Taylor the success that he deserved. In 1923, Mr. Taylor was elected vice-president of the First State Bank & Trust Company of this city. This office he held until February, 1924, when he was elected president. Since that time Mr. Taylor has devoted most of his time in making the First State Bank the strong and popular institution that it is oday.
