**PATENTS GRANTED TO TEXANS**

Of 880 patents issued in the last week, Texas inventors obtained 12. That these inventions are worth while is attested by the number of patents that already have been assigned for manufacture and sale. In other cases the inventors are planning to manufacture themselves or still are negotiating for assignments or royalties.

The following information is compiled by Munn & Co., of New York and Washington, patent and trademark attorneys.

Joseph J. Elms of Dallas. Automatic ball-jointed trip post for well equipment. This relates to trip make up posts for oil or water well equipment and refers more specifically to an automatic ball jointed trip up post for such wells.

William R. Cox of Baird. Tractor and portable drilling machine. This device may be propelled under its own power from place to place where its services are needed.

Martin William Brown of Galveston. Water muffler. This relates to improvements in water mufflers and consists in certain improvements over the device shown and described in application of similar title, filed August 4, 1924.

Ralph E. Higgs of Dallas. Cleaning instrument for matrices in type setting machines. This has relation to type cleaning instruments and relates to a device for cleaning the matrices in a typesetting apparatus such as the linotype or similar machine.

Albert Le Blanc of San Antonio. Belt stretcher. This has relation to a tightening tool and more particularly to a stretcher for taking up slacks in a drive belt.

Claude A. Hooton of Houston, and John Streun of Sherman. Cotton trampler. This relates to an improvement in cotton trampers and has especial application to the means by which the tramping service may be made automatic, or nearly so, in its action. The inventors assign their patent to Hardwicke-Etter Co.

Lee J. Black of Beaumont. Pump. This relates to improvements in pumps and more particularly to an improvement in the construction of slush pumps.

Frank Reaugh of Oak Cliff. Pump or motor. In this construction a

plurality of piston members are mounted on a rotor so as to rotate about their own individual axes.

Marion Richey of Daisetta. Pitman. This provides a pitman which is of simple construction and may be cheaply and easily produced and which is very effective for the purposes intended.

Saluda Martin of Fort Worth. Art bag. This relates to an art bag for school pupils. It is a convenient bag in which drawing paper, crayons, pencils and other articles can be carried to and from school.

William S. Johnson of Waco. Drag. This relates to improvements in drags or implements for use in road-way or highway building.



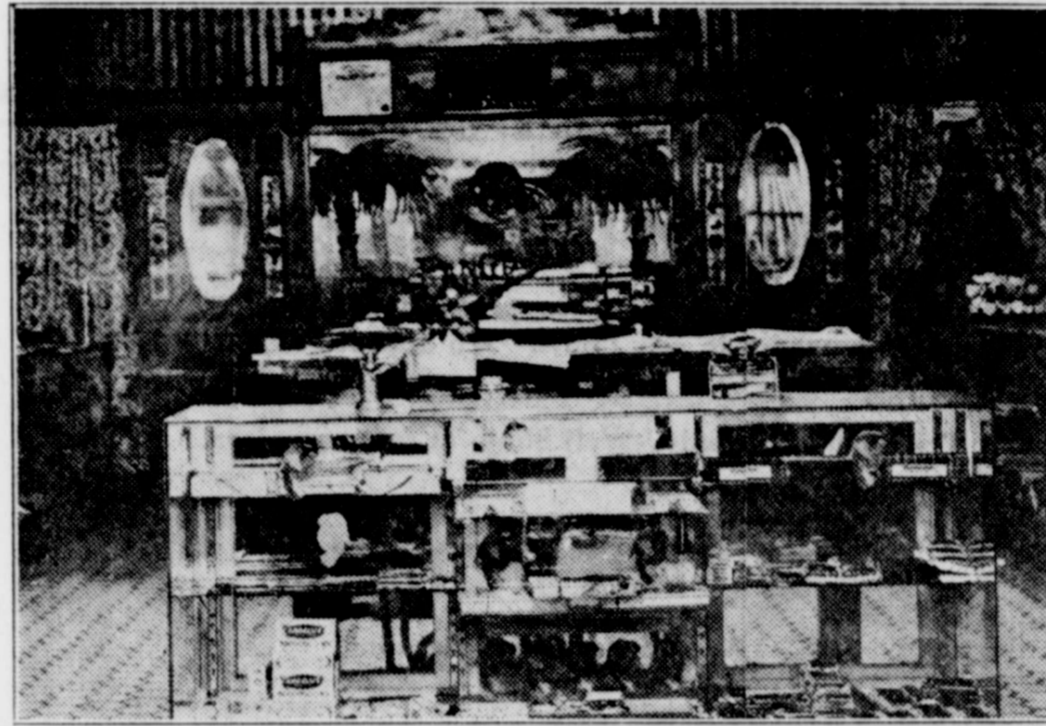
