

WHAT'S DOING IN WEST TEXAS.

SONORA—A two day's meeting of the sheep and goat men of this territory has just been closed at the Experiment Station near here. Over two thousand persons were in attendance at this meeting. B. Youngblood and J. M. Jones both of A. and M. College were the principal speakers.

BRADY—The Brady Chamber of Commerce Egg Demonstration farm may now be said to be in actual operation. The half-dozen eggs representing the first output of the farm are on exhibiting in the show window of the Broad Mercantile Co., and are creating considerable interest.

PLAINVIEW—The first district meeting of the West Texas Farm Bureau was held here on August 20-21. The district comprises thirty-eight counties immediately surrounding Hale County and more than 2,000 farmers attended this meeting. Col. Clarence Outley was the principal speaker.

CISCO—The Williams Service Company, airplane transportation and mail service, to operate between Fort Worth and Los Angeles, has notified the Cisco Chamber of Commerce that the company will use the Cisco aviation field for landing passengers, mail and freight. The company will have a representative here shortly to install the forty-acre tract secured for the landing field in Cisco.

LORAINE—In a special election held here this week, bonds amounting to \$30,000 were authorized for the purpose of improving and extending the water works system.

MINERAL WELLS—The first bale of cotton for the 1925 season was brought here today by W. W. Harrington of the Pleasant Valley community. After being ginned the bale was auctioned off in front of the Chamber of Commerce building by the Davidson-Caldwell Hardware Company for 28.65. The bale weighed 420 pounds, bringing a total of \$99.33.

AMHERST—Amherst voted bonds amounting to \$50,000 for a water works system. The election was carried by a large majority. Contracts will be let shortly.

FRIONA—The Friona Star, published by John White, secretary for the Commercial Club, is said to be the newest newspaper published on the Plains. The paper is now being printed in Clovis, pending the arrival of the machinery for the new plant.

ARTESIA, N. M.—The first high line for power transmission in this section has recently been completed from Roswell to Artesia. The line carries 33,000 volts and the juice will be turned on this week. This system will enable Hagerman, Dexter and Lake Arthur to have the same class of service as will be maintained here.

MUNDAY—According to H. F. Barnes, agent for the Wichita Valley railroad, who has just returned from Boulder, Colorado, the receipts at Munday excel those at Boulder, Colorado, a city of 16,000 population

by more than \$60,000 per year. Mr. Barnes says this is due to the extraordinary large amount of agricultural products shipped from this territory.

LUBBOCK—W. D. Benson, Sr., of Breckenridge, who has a large amount of property here, let contracts this week for a two-story brick building in the business section of Lubbock to house a United stage depot which has been needed here for a long time with stage lines operating in every direction out of Lubbock.

AMERICA HAS MOST OF WORLD'S TELEPHONES

There are nearly twice as many telephones in the United States as in all the rest of the world put together.

This striking statement, illustrative of American initiative and genius, is brought out in the figures, just compiled, showing the world's telephones. Out of a total of 24,576,121 telephones in use in the world on January 1, 1924, there were 15,369,545, or 63 per cent in the United States.

Europe had 6,390,765 telephones, or 26 per cent of the total, and the remaining 2,815,902 telephones, comprising 11 per cent of the whole, were scattered throughout Asia, Africa, Oceania and the western hemisphere outside of this country.

The United States had one telephone for every 7 people while in all other countries combined there was but one telephone for each 185 of inhabitants.

On January 1, 1924, there were 13.7 telephones for every 100 of population of the United States, as compared with 3.8 in Germany, 2.5 in Great Britain, 1.5 in France and 0.4 in Italy. The nearest approach to the United States record was Canada, with 11 telephones, and Denmark,

with 8.7 telephones per 100 of population. These figures take on added significance when it is recalled that most of the telephones in Canada and Denmark are owned and operated by private companies, as in the United States, while the telephone system of Germany, Great Britain and France are under government ownership.

ADVERTISING DID IT.

Wrigley, the chewing gum man, has explained how he built up a business of millions of packages a day.

He has done it by sticking to his one line and advertising it. He spends over a million dollars a year in buying newspaper space to tell the world about 5-cent chewing gum. He has educated people to chew gum and to chew Wrigley's. He did not stop shouting as soon as he attracted attention.

He says you must keep it up or the buyers will forget you. Whether yours is a 5-cent or a \$50,000 business, keep telling about it.

ELECTED TO TAILORS' GUILD.

T. W. Windle of Hermleigh has been elected to membership in the Born Tailors' Guild, a national association of master tailors, according to word from the headquarters of the organization in Chicago. The Guild, with the slogan "Tailors are born and not made," aims at lifting the tailoring profession to a higher plane of perfection in the art of making clothes and to establish in the minds of men and young men in definite appreciation of style, fabric and tailors in clothes.

The Born Tailors' Guild is attempt-

ing to model its organization after the craft organizations of the early English times, according to W. A. Churchill, who is its executive secretary. "The members of the old Guilds were bound by oath of brotherhood to uphold the standard of the profession and to pass down from generation to generation the treasured secrets of their craft. Before a man could become a master tailor he had to serve seven years as an apprentice and two years as a journeyman during which time he was taught all the skill and secrets of the trade. The present Guild has much the same spirit. Our purpose is to build together the mast tailors of America

in an effort to raise the standards of trade to the end that it may be placed in the class of an art. We further seek to bring back into the tailoring craft some of the old-time romance and idealism of Tooley street. And above all we want our tailors to reassert their pride in the perfection of

workmanship and to study men's dress as a profession."

The Grand Master of the Guild is M. Born of Chicago, head of the tailoring house of M. Born & Company, which he established fifty years ago and in whose honor the Guild was named.

I have finished the required sewing of the first year's club work; made three pairs of window curtains, two table runners; helped make one dress, made over three dresses and dyed one dress; made four pairs of teds, one princess slip; patched three dresses and one gown, hemmed sixteen dish towels and four wash cloths for home use; helped make over two cotton mattresses.

In the spring I helped to plant and care for the spring garden, which consisted of turnips, English peas, onions, beans, radishes, beets, cucumbers, squashes, tomatoes, cantaloupes and cabbage. I canned fourteen gallons of cucumbers besides we ate some fresh. I canned five and one-half gallons beets, and gave away some to other club members. After using green onions all the spring, I had sixty bunches which averaged two and one-half pounds per bunch, making one hundred and fifty pounds. If I had sold these I could have gotten eight or ten cents per pound, which would have made about fifteen dollars worth besides what we used green. We had green peas about two months for home use. I gathered about forty pounds of English peas off of the spring vines. We used vegetables from all the other for the table all of the spring and summer. Besides my spring gardens I have started a good fall garden. After I had taken up my onions I cut all of the weeds and grass and carried them out. On this ground I planted three rows of beans, and one row of cucumbers. These are up now, growing nicely. I irrigate them often so they will have plenty of time to make. Where the old cucumbers and corn were I prepared the

ground and planted beans, peas and turnips. These are all up and are looking good. Where our early mustard and lettuce were volunteer plants have come up so I will not have to plant any while my fall garden is getting ready for use we have green peas and other vegetables to use.

I have cooked the foods which we were required to cook; besides this I have cooked supper and dinner many times; cooked cakes and pies; prepared food for lunches and helped with the general cooking.

I helped do all the milking. Since the first club meeting we have gotten five hundred and sixteen gallons of milk and ninety pounds of but-

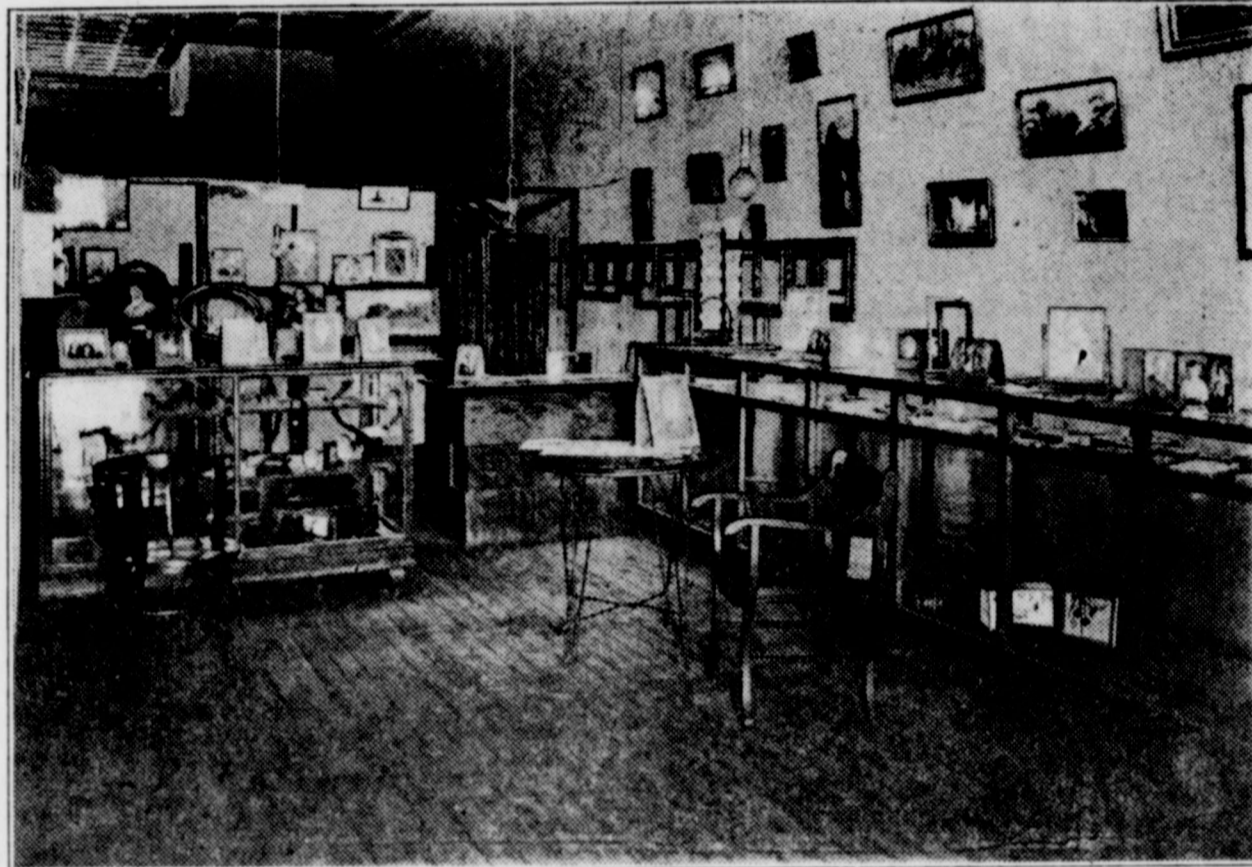
