These fans are capable of delivering 100,000 cubic feet of fresh, cool air into the building a minute. Music for this beautiful theatre is supplied by a Reproduco Pipe Organ. It is powerful in tone possibilities, yet capable of being shaded to any degree desired. This instrument may be self-played and offers relief from the regular routine of music from rolls.

The owner of this theatre, Mr. T. L. Lollar, has been in the show business in Snyder for the past four years and has been very successful in the operation of his business. He had dreams for the future and with the intention of realizing these dreams he built the Palace

Theatre. The opening of this theatre introduced a new era in the show business in Snyder, if not in West Texas. Mr. Lollar is one of the best and most enterprising business men in our town. The question of dif-ferent classes of laborers, the rent of land, the interest on capital, the profits of interprise, are parts of the general problem of distribution.

The people have recognized that the utilization of social income is very important but they have almost ignored it as a branch of economics. One reason that they have ignored this is because they doubtless feel that everyone should be left to spend his income as he likes. But a few people are beginning to find that this is more important than production, exchange or distribution.




