# **Commissioners accept resignations**

# County clerk, sheriff leaving at end of month By TERESA STONE Journal staff writer

County Commissioners accepted resignations from County Clerk Billie Downing and Sheriff Jerry Hicks during Monday's meeting.

Hicks is retiring after serv-

ing Bailey County for 16 years as Deputy and Sheriff.

Downing, who has not given a reason for her decision, has been serving the county since January of 1995. Both resignations become effective Dec. 31.

After accepting Hick's resignation, the Commissioner's Court appointed Coy Plott to complete Hick's unexpired term as Bailey County Sheriff.

"It's nice to be working at home again," said Plott, who has worked as a deputy in Lamb County. "This gives me a chance to be involved in my community and help out."

Plott, who has lived in Muleshoe since 1988, has been involved in law enforcement for seven years.

Last Friday, Plott was sworn in as a Bailey County deputy.

Although the term is not up until 2000, the commissioner's appointment of Plott is only valid until the November 1998

general election.

Texas law requires that Hick's unexpired term be filled during the next general election.

If elected by the voters, Plott will have to run again in the regularly scheduled Sheriff's election in 1999 for a new term.

Commissioners did not appoint a replacement for Downing, although several ex-

DENVER CITY — Muleshoe has taken a big game hunter mentality so far this season.

The target this weekend was the host of the Denver City Tournament.

The Mules won three games in two days, including a convincing 70-54 triumph Friday against the Denver City Mustangs.

Sandwiched around the Denver City game were hohum wins against Seagraves (67-60) and Plains (72-67).

Muleshoe (8-1) finished the three-day, round-robin tournament tied with Denver City with a 3-1 mark. The Mules were awarded the tournament title due to least points allowed. Muleshoe coach Ralph Mason said the Mules have shown the ability to get up for big games but still lack the wherewithal to put away lesser opponents. Douglass Field returned from an eye injury with a 12point, eight rebound effort in the Denver City win. Matt Mason added 12 points on four 3-pointers and Dustin Cleavinger finished with 11 points against the Mustangs.

The Chamber recognized three floats for their creativity in keeping with the theme.

# **Officials offer winter weather tips**

Winter is well on its way and the inevitability of severe weather is descending upon the South Plains.

Although most natives know what to expect from a West Texas winter, many are waiting to see if the warming of the eastern Pacific waters, known as the El Nino, will have any effect on the local weather.

In the past El Nino winters have produced some of the snowiest winters around Muleshoe, reports the National Weather Service (NWS). In fact, the greatest snow storm and snowiest season happened in 1982-1983, which is the strongest El Nino ever recorded.

But Muleshoe is far enough north of the equator, where the effects of El Nino are the greatest, that the recorded results of the phenomenon are inconsistent, especially since many factors can affect the weather.

On average, El Nino results in an 80 percent increase

in precipitation for the area from November through March, reports the NWS.

However even with the predicted increase in precipitation, the NWS states that the area would still only receive about 6 inches total during the five months.

Regardless if El Nino will effect Muleshoe or not, the fact remains that the weather is gradually getting colder, the possibility of dangerous conditions are increasing, and people are starting to travel more for the holiday season.

As travelers start on their way, no matter if the trip is 20 miles or 200 miles, preparations need to be made in case of severe winter weather, said DPS Safety Officer, John Gonzales of Lubbock.

"People need to plan ahead and be prepared," said Gonzales. "Take extra food and blankets, just in case you do get stranded and always let someone know where you are going and when to expect you."

Gonzales said that one of the main problems this time of year is that travelers are in a hurry. "People need to slow down. Speed is a major factor in accidents. Just because you may be the only car on the road, it doesn't mean it's safe to drive fast. Many collisions involve only one car."

"Also, don't over drive. Fatigue is a big problem as people rush home from work, load up the kids and then drive for hours. They don't realize what ing tired. They jeopardize their own life, their families, and driving in the daytime. "Visothers on the road."

# WEATHER TERMS

As drivers do take to the road, it is recommended to listen to the weather forecast to know what to expect.

Here are some winter terms that may be heard throughout the winter.

Winter storm watch --- conditions are favorable for hazardous winter weather to develop within 12 to 24 hours, though it is still an uncertain event. This watch includes possible blizzard conditions, heavy snow, accumulations of freezing rain or drizzle, or heavy sleet.

Winter storm warning --- hazardous winter weather is imminent or already occurring. Heavy snow, dangerous accumulations of freezing rain or drizzle, or heavy sleet is expected. These elements could create conditions leading to injuries or loss of life.

Winter weather advisory - issued for a mix of winter weather that will create a significant inconvenience. This is typically issued when freezing rain, drizzle and/or light snow is expected to create hazardous driving conditions.

Freezing rain or freezing drizzle advisory - an accumulation of ice making roads and other exposed surfaces hazardous. Also possibly causing tree branches and power lines to break.





AMARILLO — Ideas and technologies that guide irrigation decisions will be the focus of the Jan. 7 irrigation conference, says Leon New, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Our goal is to give growers information they can use to make key decisions," said New, who has organized the event scheduled at the Civic Center for more than two decades.

Registration begins at 8:30 a.m. with the program's first hour to include time for trade show tours and free coffee and donuts. The \$7 registration fee also includes a catered lunch.

The opening session begins by 9:30 a.m. where speakers will address topics featuring irrigated soybean production and well and pump performance. Other briefings will include precision production using yield monitors and site mapping.

An overview of the Texas Water Plan (with a review of S.B. 1) will be presented by C. E. Williams, manager of the Panhandle Ground Water District.
