

Porter who announced that these checks represent a final distribution on the past year's cotton from the county marketed orderly and co-operatively through the Association. In addition to the initial advance made at the time the cotton was shipped, distributions have also been made in December and Feb-

A special meeting of the membership has been called for 2 o'clock, Hermleigh, Texas, at the tabernacle when E. M. Baldwin, district director of the Association, will present the checks to members and give detailed information on the organization, operation and progress of the Association, as well as plans for the future. This meeting will undoubtedly prove one of the most interesting meetings of its kind ever held in the county, and according to Mr. Porter, a special invitation has been extended to non-members and to business men, as well as women, to attend. "It will be an ideal opportunity for everyone to get a clear, concise and understandable message on just what cotton co-operative marketing is and how it operates," Mr. Porter said.

The distribution of this approximate \$29,-068.81 at Hermleigh Saturday is a part of the personal distribution of some \$3,500,000 which is being made by other association directors and officials of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association over the State during the three days of Thursday. Friday and Saturday. This plan of making the final distribution is being tried this year in Texas for the first time, and in addition to the distribution of these funds, special charts will be shown and explained covering the season's business in completing the sixth year of its operation. Deliveries during the coming season will open the seventh year, and representatives feel that a substantial increase will be noted in the cotton delivered to co-operative marketing channels from this county. 


