also contains an informative booklet discussing the Ogallaala Formation and an explaination of how to use the maps contained in the atlas
By reviewing the information contained in the maps, irrigators can determine how deep they need to drill to reach water and how dee they would have to go to complete a well to the bottom of the water-bearing formation.

## KMUL radio celebrating 40 years of Spanish music

When Noe Anzaldua moved to Mule-
shoe 40 years ago, he never would have imagined that he would soon be launching a radio broadcasting career.
Soon after his arrival into town Anzaldua was asked to translate and record a commercial in Spanish for the local radio station KMUL
"I had never made a spot before, never even held a microphone close," said Anzaldua, who admitted that at first he was reluctant but after almost two weeks station owner Gilbert Lamb finally convinced him to give it a shot.
After the commercial was completed, Lamb asked Anzaldua to host a 30-minute radio show in Spanish every Saturday and Sunday.

The show was the beginning of Spanish broadcasting in Muleshoe. With the increasing number of Spanish speaking residents, the demand for more air time was soon apparent. Quickly, Anzaldua's airtime increased.
Then in 1992 when Anzaldua took over as general manager of KMUL, the station changed its format to continuous Spanish broadcasting
Looking back on the last 40 years in radio, Anzaldua realizes that many things

First we used 78 s , then 33 s and 45 s , to cassettes and now CDs which make programming much easier

Another major change in the radio business, Anzaldua said, is that the big bands no longer give live shows from the stations like they used to do.
Anzaldua looks back fondly on his career.
"I have really enjoyed meeting the people and the opportunity that the radio station has given me to help people in the community.
Helping people has always been a priority for Anzaldua. Many times he has rallied support from the KMUL listeners to help local families in need.
Tocelebrate his 40th anniversary with KMUL, Anzaldua is once more doing something for the community

## Gifts from the kitchen

Instant Brownie Mix
4 cups flour 6 cups sugar
3 cups cocoa 4 tsp. baking powder
$\begin{array}{ll}3 \text { cups cocoa } & 4 \text { tsp. baking powder } \\ 3 \text { tsp. salt } & 2 \text { cups vegetable shortening }\end{array}$
Combine all ingredients except shortening and mix well. Using a pastry blender or two knives, thoroughly cut in shortening. Store in an airtight container in a cool, dry place. Makes enough for eight batches of brownies.

To make brownies: Combine 2 cups brownie mix, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, $1 / 2$ cup chopped nuts. Stir just until all ingredients are moistened. Spread in a lightly greased 8 -inch square baking pan. Bake in 350 degree oven 20 to 25 minutes or until set in center.

Gift idea: Pack brownie mix in a decorated cloth bag along with the recipe. Add a batch of freshly baked brownies packed in an old fashion tin.
Cinnamon Ornaments
1 can ( 4 oz. ) cinnamon 1 Tbsp. cloves
1 Tbsp. nutmeg - $3 / 4$ cup applesauce
2 Tbsp. white glue
In medium bowl, combine cinnamon, cloves and nutmeg. Add applesauce and glue; stir to combine. Work mixture with hands 2 to 3 minutes or until dough is smooth and ingredients are thoroughly mixed. Divide into 4 portions. Roll out each dough portion to $1 / 4$ inch thickness. Cut dough with cookie cutters of desired shapes. Using a straw or toothpick, make a small hole in top of ornament. Place cutouts on wire racks and allow to dry at room temperature for several days until completely dry. Thread ribbon through hole in ornament.
DO NOT EAT! Makes about 32 (2-inch) ornaments. Heavenly Honey Topping
$1 / 3$ cup unsalted almonds $1 / 3$ cup chocolate chips
$1 / 3$ cup unsalted pecans $1 / 2$ cup honey, or more as needed Sterilize a $1 / 2$ pint wide-mouth jar or other decorative jar. Place almonds in a jar and cover with a layer of honey. Repeat with chocolate chips and then with pecans, filling to jar brim with honey as needed. Tightly close jar with lid. 12 servings. Makes 1 1/2 pint jar.
Fruit Butter
Beat together $1 / 2$ cup margarine, softened with 1 jar ( 18 oz .) marmalade. Mix well and store in refrigerator in a sealed container. Very good on toast, biscuits, pancakes, or waffles. Keeps indefinitely.
Variation: may use strawberry or apricot preserves or add 1 cup of raspberry preserves to the marmalade.

For gifts, place in air tight jelly jar and tie ribbon around lid Hot glue appropriate decorations on outside.
Puppy Chow
Melt together in microwave or double boiler
1/3 cup Margarine
1 cup peanut butter
1 pkg. ( 12 oz .) chocolate chips
Stir to mix. Pour over
1 box (17 oz.) Crispex cereal
Measure into large plastic bag
3 cups powdered sugar
Add coated cereal mixture. Gently work plastic bag back and forth several times until cereal separates and is coated well. This keeps well and will freeze.

Advance－fee loans
As part of Operation Loan Shark，the OAG＇s Consumer Pro－
tection Division won a permanent injunction against a Califomia injunction against a California
telemarketing firm that adverised loans in newspapers and maga－ zines，targeting consumers with bad credit or no credit history．Consum－ ers who responded were required to pay $\$ 29.95$ before their loan appli－ cations would be processed．Instead of receiving a loan or credit，con－ sumers who paid the fee only re－
ceived new soliciations from an－ other company．
Be wary of any credit offer that for a loan you are a inaranteed to for a loan you are guaranteed to
receive．This is especially true for receive．This is especialy true for
credit offers made by telemarketers． credid offers made by telemakketers．
Under federal law，a telemarketer Under federal law，a telemarketer
who says you are guaranted a loan is barred from asking for orrecitat lenders never＂guarantee＂credit or say you are likely to get a loan or
credit before you apply，especially if you have bad credit，no credit，or a bankruptey in your past． Zero－percent interest offers Responding to consumer com－
plaints，our Consumer Protection Division has forced a wide variety of national and regional retailers to
change the way they advertise zero－ percent interest offers．Many con－ sumers complained that they were misled into belicying that no interest would be charged when retailers advertised，＂No Payments，No Inter－ advertised，＂No Pe
In fact，interest was tallied from the date of the purchase．Consumers could avoid paying the interest charge only if they paid the debt before the one－year grace period
ended．Consumers who waited a year before making payments were required to pay the full amount of interest．
