AN ORDINANCE DEFINING RULES FOR PARKING OF VEHICLES UPON THE PUB-LIC SQUARE AND FOR ONE BLOCK ON STREETS LEAD. ING ONTO THE PUBLIC SQUARE OF THE CITY OF SNYDER, TEXAS; AND ALSO PROVIDING FOR ALL MO-TOR DRAWN VEHICLES TO COME TO A STOP IMME-DIATELY BEFORE ENTER-ING UPON SAID SQUARE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SNYDER, TEXAS: Sec. 1. All automobiles, trucks motorcycles and other vehicles motor drawn or not, parked upon Snyder, as is now or shall here-6-4tc after be provided with well defined parking places, designated and separated by distinct lines and marks, shall be parked wholly within an open space between two of said lines; and shall be so A GALLON OF MOTOR OIL- parked that no part of said vehicle Someone Saturday, Aug. 6, put a or anything attached to it or progallon of motor oil in the wrong jecting from it, will cover or procar. The owner can have same ject over any part of any parking

> Sec. 2. All vehicles parked as provided in Section 1 above, shall be parked with one wheel against the curb , except vehicles parked in the parking spaces provided in the middle of the streets, which vehicles shall be parked with their fronts even with the fore-end of the parking space entered.

> Sec. 3. Any person violating any provision of Section 1 or Section 2 of this ordinance shall be fined not less than one nor more than one hundred dollars.

> Section 4. Any person driving or operating any automobile, truck, motorcycle or other motor drawn vehicle, moving in the direction of the public square, upon any street in the Sity of Snyder leading directly upon said square, shall not while within a distance not greater than one block from said square, drive or operate said vehicle at a rate of speed greater than 18 miles per hour.

Cec. 5. Any person driving or operating a motor drawn vehicle shall immediately before operating or driving said vehicle upon the public square of the City of Snyder and before any part of said vehicle crosses either line defining the pedestrian lane adjacent to said square; bring said vehicle to a complete stop.
