G. S. Davis and family have returned from New Mexico where they visited friends and relatives.

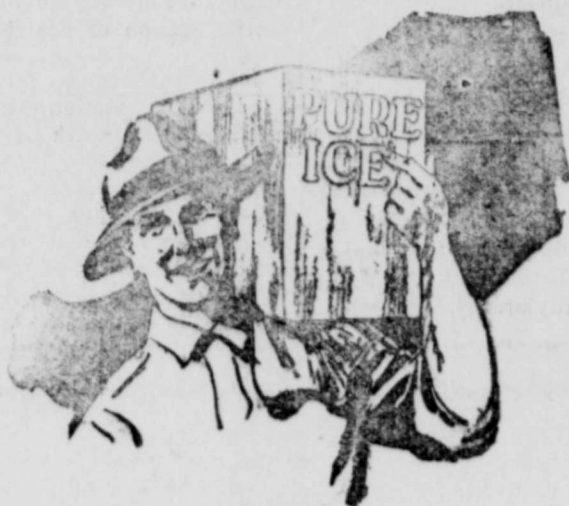
A number of the Ennis Creek folks attended the fifth Sunday singing at Pleasant Hill and reported a good singing.
