#### Sixteen Farmers Visit Station at Spur Monday

Sixteen men formed a caravan Monday morning in a pilgrimage to the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station located near Spur The day was ideal. Every mem ber of the party enjoyed a very interesting and profitable day.

Upon locating R. E. Dickson, superintendent of the experiment station, the tour over the farm be gan. The party was very much impressed with the practical man-ner in which the experiments were conducted, the efficiency of the farm, and the information that

Mr. Dickson first led the party over to the cotton variety test blocks. The maturity, staple, character, size of bolls, storm re-sistance, type of stalk, and ease of picking of each variety was observed. These varieties included four strains of Mebane, Cliett, Half and Half, Cook, Westex, Kasch, Lone Star, Rowden, Durango, Lightning Express, Boykin, Acala, Truitt and a Mebane selec-Acala, Truitt and a Mebane selection that had been made over a period of ten years at the farm. It was very easy to note the various characteristics of the different varieties. Half and Half led all varieties over a number of years in yield, but a good strain of Mebane was considered the most valuable cotton and the best to plant. Half and Half can not be plant. # Fluvanna Community It's Resources and Possibilites Won First Prize 1927 Scurry Co. Fair

GEOGRAPHICALLY

It includes about 250 square miles and is situated in the northwest part of Scurry County (and lapping over into Borden), at the head of Deep Creek and on top of the divide between the Colorado and Brazos river systems; and has an altitude of 2665 feet.

#### CLIMATIC CONDITIONS

Are, on the average, very good. It is true we have some windy days—some very warm and some very cold days; nevertheless, real sand storms seldom occur, and our temperatures range from about ten to one hundred and ten degrees above zero—60 degrees being about the average for the year; and a range of 30 degrees being common for a single day. Zero weather is rarely experienced. Many would think 110 degrees unbearable; but at our altitude, and with constant breezes, it is not nearly so oppressive as 90 degrees in low altitudes where humidity is much greater.

Average precipitation is about 22 inches. This is on a basis of measurements taken over a period of twelve years (1915-1926) and including the great drouth. Last year we got 30 3-8 inches of water. With the help of the usual cool nights; our deep, fertile soil will produce abundant crops on 20 inches of water fairly well distributed.

Both our geographical position and climatic conditions are conducive to good health. We usually breathe a clean, dry atmsophere; hence, malaria is unknown. Then we are practically free from annoying and germ-carrying insects, such as mosquitoes and the different kinds of ticks—none of the latter—even chiggers being of little consequence.

#### GENERAL RESOURCES

—Are evidently ample but only slightly developed. Usually an ample supply of good, soft water is found at an average depth of 100 feet. The early-day open range has yielded to pasture and farm; and the old time longhorns have given place to select and highly bred cattle—usually Hereford for beef and marketing and the Jersey for milk. Well bred horses and mules are raised in sufficient numbers for local use. A few farmers and stock men are finding goats and sheep profitable; while nearly every barnyard has a few hogs and is well stocked with fowls.

Our soil is a sandy loam in some places; but mainly black and closely related to the black wax lands of Central Texas. Either kind is drouth-resisting and very productive when fair seasons prevail. A considerable variety of products may be grown here; but those receiving the most attention at this time are cotton, maize, kaffir, sorghum, millet, corn and sudan. Our gins put up 3213 bales of cotton last season—this in spite of the fact that only a small proportion of our tillable lands are under cultivation. Different varieties of peas, beans and garden vegetables are being grown, but not as extensively, perhaps, as they should be. Nevertheless, Fluvanna booth in our recent County Fair, won the highest prize, and was regarded by many an excellent exhibit of home-grown agricultural products.

Oil and mineral tests are being made, and it is believed, on the best of authority, that oil especially will be produced in rich quantities in due time.

#### FLUVANNA

—Our commercial and social center—has splendid graded dirt roads leading in all directions. We have one railroad, the Roscoe, Snyder and Pacific, which terminates here; while the great Santa Fe, Panhandle division—is only six miles away. We have six stores, two restaurants, blacksmith shop, lumber yard, bank, telephone exchange, three garages and two gins. Our business men have an eye single not only to their private interests, but to the interest of their customers and the community. This is evidenced by the recent organization of a Chamber of Commerce.

#### THE EDUCATIONAL AND RELIGIOUS INTEREST

—Of the community are provided by a splendid independent high school, having six teachers and housed in a two-story brick structure, having six class rooms, a library room and an auditorium. In addition to ordinary equipment the school has a good library, a high grade piano and a good start on laboratory equipment. In addition to this central school, there are three district schools a few miles out.

There are five church organizations—Christian, Methodist, Presbyterian and two Baptist churches; each maintaining a Sunday school and regular preaching services. Each church has a commodious building, and each of the two largest of these will accommodate 300 people. Three of the buildings are furnished with pianos, factory-built pews, etc.

Really, the Fluvanna community is a good place to live. Come and see.
