FOOD FOR THOUGHT

In 1927 the United States produced one billion four hundred sixtyseven thousand pounds of creamery butter. Of this supply, Texas with 9 per cent of the total farm land of the United States and 41/2 per cent of the population produced less than 1 per cent.

In the month of November, 1927, the state of Minnesota produced 14,364,800 pounds of creamery butter which was two and one half million pounds more than the combined production of Texas and thirty other states. In that same month 17 states with a little more than onethird of the farming lands produced 74,359,200 pounds of creamery butter while 31 states including Texas and all other cotton states, produced 11,878,800 pounds.

Last November the state of Nebraska with an area one-fourth that of Texas and population of about one-fourth that of Texas produced ten times as much creamery butter as Texas produced in the same time. and Texas furnished them their cotton seed meal to help them along.

Every time a bale of cotton is hauled off of the farm there is removed from the soil \$11.90 of its fertility as follows: 35 cents in the lint, 75 cents in the hulls and \$10.90 in the cotton seed meal. The capital stock of our farming industry is the fertility of the soil. Is it wise to allow that fertility to be shipped out of Texas to Europe and to our

Why does Texas not produce more pork and dairy products? Is it because the seasons are too severe? The three states, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Iowa, with long, cold winters and short hot summere, produce more than one-third of the butter and cheese of the United States. Is it because we have to much warm weather? Look at Australia-on the other side of the earth and in a much hotter locationyet they shipped to the U.S. more than a million pounds of creamery butter in thirty days ending January 15 this year.

Another thing of interest is that in the year 1926 Texas produced two hundred fifteen million pounds of pork, while Texas consumed four hundred forty-eight million pounds of pork.

Some one has said that the reason Texas does not have more dairy cows on the farms is that the farmers do not understand caring for them. It might also be said that 20 years ago the farmers of Texas did not know how to drive a Ford. Yet they did not hesitate to invest their money in Fords and risk learning to drive them. With that same determination they can learn the dairy cow business. The first step is to set aside two or three acres to grow feed on for each good cow that is to be kept on the farm.



CHICKS SHOULD BE GIVEN GOOD CARE

Raising strong baby chicks is not a difficult matter when the fundamental principles are understood and carefully practiced. Young chicks require: 1. Regular attention; 2. proper feeding (a-void over feeding); 3. an abundance of fresh air, sunlight and clean water; and 4. cleanliness and sanitation.

Before hatching time plans should be made for the housing. Therefore, a well constructed brood coop or house should be ready for the baby chicks. The house or coop should be built so that it will be easily cleaned and in connection with it there should be a yard or extension run, thus providing the necessary sunlight and fresh air. 


