# **COW FEED OR WEEVIL FEED**

From the study of the yearly records of 100,000 individual cows, Mr. Wintermeyer reports the relation between production of butterfat and income over cost of feed per cow annually as follows:

The above figures are averages for the United States both as to income and at the Snyder prices the net income over feed cost would be higher if skim milk were properly utilized.




