Gold in Eggs... Official records at the Snyder Produce Company plant show where \$32,116.60 has been paid for eggs alone since the first day of January.

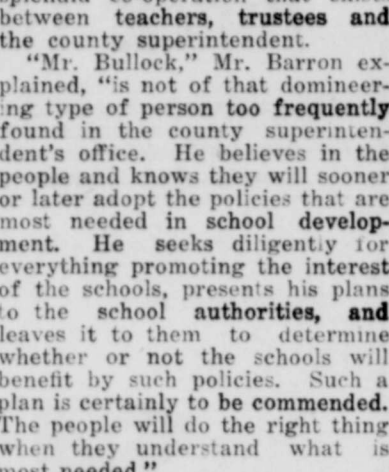
