Lotto reaches \$45 million

Just imagine making \$1.8 million every year for the next 25 years. If you happen to be the only winner Wednesday in the Texas lottery, that's about how much you can expect to get from the estimated \$45 million jackpot.

According to lottery officials, it is the highest jackpot since last November.

Local stores are reporting an increase in lottery ticket sells with regular buyers spending even more money and people who don't normally play deciding to try their luck.

One convenience store worker said that she has had customers spend more than \$500 on tickets. But on average, she said that the regulars are spending anywhere from \$50 to \$100 more, while new customers are spending \$2 to \$10.

Stores are expecting the big rush for tickets to be Wednesday, the day of the drawing. First, because people have a habit of waiting until the last minute, and second, many store clerks said that they have heard customers say time and time again that the ticket has to be bought on the day of the drawing to be lucky.

Playoff hopes gone

Dimmitt sweeps MHS

The Muleshoe Mules' dream season has turned into a night-

Expected to contend for a playoff berth, the Mules have tumbled to the middle of the District 1-3A standings and out of the playoff picture.

Dimmitt used a long-range attack and 13 second-half points from Charlie Sanders to beat Muleshoe 53-47 Tuesday, the Mules' third-straight loss and fourth in seven games.

Dimmitt (19-7 overall, 8-1 in district) rained in eight 3pointers, including three in a row late in the game which proved to be the difference.

Derek Buckley banged home two 3-pointers in the fourth quarter, including the back-breaker with three minutes left that gave the No. 4ranked Bobcats a 51-45 lead.

Sanders led the Bobcats with 15 points and Jared Townsend supplied four 3-pointers and 12 points off the bench.

Dustin Cleavinger led Muleshoe with 22 points. No other Mule scored more than six points as poor outside shooting

County law officers involved in another high-speed chase

Bailey County Law enforcement officers were involved in their second high speed car chase in just under two weeks.

Late Saturday night, Tracy Frazier of Albuquerque sped through New Mexico and three Texas counties before finally being stopped in Littlefield.

According to police reports, Frazier, 26, was traveling from Albuquerque to Dallas on Highway 84 around midnight when he was clocked at more than 100 m.p.h. between Clovis and

Frazier, who later admitted to police he was under the influence of drugs, was driving an extended cab Ford Ranger with his girlfriend and four young children.

Bailey County Sheriff Coy Plott said the suspect was clocked at nearly 100 mph while travelling through Muleshoe with city and county patrol cars in pursuit.

The Littlefield Police and Department of Public Safety deployed spikes near FM 54, which blew out two tires on the subject's truck but failed to stop him. Having no more spikes, DPS officer Sam Gonzales said they decided the only way to stop Frazier was to shoot out the rear tire.

According to Gonzales, Frazier cut across the

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

Makeshift lineup sparks Muleshoe

Lady Mules win fourth straight

DALHART - With several starters in foul trouble, Muleshoe coach Jim Gruhlkey hoped to steal a few minutes at the start of the third quarter in Friday's District 1-3A girls basketball game.

The Muleshoe coach got a lot more.

Going with an undersized lineup that included four reserves for most of the third quarter, Muleshoe played Dalhart to a near standstill.

Long enough for Erin Wilhite to take over.

Wilhite, who sat out the third quarter with three fouls along with leading scorer Lindsey Field, tossed in 14 of her gamehigh 17 points in the fourth quarter as Muleshoe slipped by Dalhart 51-42 for its fourthstraight win.

Wilhite scored eight-straight Muleshoe points during one stretch and converted 8 of 10 free throws as Muleshoe (15-10 overall, 6-4 in district) kept its faint playoff hopes alive.

Mules fall again 61-51

DALHART—The only button Muleshoe coach Ralph Mason hasn't pushed lately is the panic one.

Muleshoe continued its free fall Friday, dropping a 61-51 decision to Dalhart, a team the Mules thumped by 33 points earlier this season.

Floundering in fourth place in the District 1-3A boys race, the Mules (17-9 overall, 4-4 in district) have lost four of their last six games, a streak that has left the players and coaching staff searching for answers.

"I could see it after the Dimmitt game (a last-second loss that started the losing spell)," Mason said. "I don't know what it is. I haven't been able to hit the right button to turn it around."

Muleshoe was sabotaged again by poor shooting, connecting on just 32 percent (19 of 58) of its shots against Dalhart. Up by three at halftime, Mules managed just four points in the third quarter.

Jason Chaffin helped Dalhart (12-11, 3-5) polish off the Mules by making five of six free throws and scoring seven points in the Boys



HOUSTON — Counting fat grams is more effective than keeping food records, according to a study conducted by researchers at The DeBakey Heart Center at Baylor College of Houston in Houston.

"For years, dietitians have used the food-record rating system to calculate how much total fat patients eat," said Dr. William Insull, professor of medicine and director of the Lipid Research Clinic at Baylor and The Methodist Hospi-

"Fat-gram counting is a simpler alternative and is less time-consuming for both the dietitian and the patient."

The food-record rating system requires dietitians to know standard recipes and exact serving sizes to "match" certain foods to a table of foods in a computer database. Foods are scored assorting to their cholesterol-lowering ability. The process can take up to an hour.

"Unlike the food-record rating which gives you more information than you need, like caloric content, fat-gram counting only gives out the fat gram value," Insull said.

Insull and registered dietitian Donna S. Roy collaborated with a research team of dietitians and recruited 78 study participants were randomly assigned to a fat-gram counting group and food-

record rating group led by dietitians to test the effectiveness of both methods. Each participant completed four three-day food records which were evaluated by food-record rating for one group and by fat-gram counting for the other group.

The dietitians used the fatgram counting method on one group and the food-record rating method on the other group.

"We found no significant differences in dietary adherence in the two groups," Insull said. "The patients in the fatgram counting group were just as well-instructed as the other

Insull says fat-gram count-

ing is easier to teach to patients and is an effective selfmonitoring tool.

"Patients don't need a computer, they can look at a tale of foods," he said. "The new food labels make it even easier to watch your fat intake."







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Time for college-bound high school seniors to start sending in applications

GEORGETOWN - If you're a college-bound high school senior, add this to your list of New Year's resolutions: getting a jump-start on your college applications.

Most universities and colleges are now processing applications from students who want to enroll in fall 1998, and many will begin making financial aid and scholarship awards in February, says John Lind, vice president for enrollment management at Southwestern University, a selective national liberal arts college located in Georgetown, TX.

Even more incentive to act quickly: students who apply early get better choices for oncampus housing and are at the head of the line for financial aid.

But where to apply?

"Some high school seniors already have decided what career path to follow, which makes choosing a college and a specific major easier," Lind

"But the vast majority are unsure about their plans, making the task of finding the school right for them rather intimidating."

He says students shouldn't fell pressured to choose a major before reaching the college classroom. Those who need help should visit with their high school guidance counselors for access to information about all sorts of colleges-subjective guides, objective guides, audio-visual packages and, in some cases, computer pro-

grams that can connect students directly to college or university admission offices.

Lind said that within the last few years, many colleges and universities, including Southwestern, have created World Wide Web sites, which students can access by using the Internet and using a search function to find the college or university that interest them.

At the sites, students can find information about the school's academic and social opportunities or even take a "virtual" tour of campus.

The average student today will change majors at least once during a college career, nationwide figures indicate. Futurist John Naisbitt predict that the typical student will change careers three or four times during a life span-the result of a job market that will continue to undergo major technological advances.

"Students really need to look carefully at themselves," says Lind. "What are they like? What is their ambition? In what type of environment are they most comfortable? So they need to relate individually to their teachers? Do they want to stay in-state?"

But don't rule out colleges on cost alone.

"Too many people begin by looking at cost and ultimately

exclude some viable options. Students should determine what type of college suits their

Application processes vary widely. While many schools rely solely on objective criteria like a student's class rank and standardized test scores, others look at the strength of the college success. The single best college preparatory background, recommendations
