

There are a lot of people in every community who say "Sure, I'm willing to do something to help push my town along;" but when it comes right down to brass tacks they stall with "well, I can't do it today," or "I'll see about it tomorrow." And "tomorrow" never comes.

There are those, too, who when asked to do some particular thing for the benefit of all, say they will do it, when, even while they are saying it they have no intention of doing it at all. When asked about it later they offer an alibi, saying, "I didn't think it amounted to anything, so didn't

Too many people think that the only thing that counts in com-munity building is something big. If it isn't something that will get their name in the paper or grow a halo around their head doesn't interest them. If they cannot be the "big toad in the puddle" they don't want to be in the puddle at all. But let me tell you this: Any industry that con-siders your town for the location of a new factory or for any of the dozen other things, is more interested in what all the little frogs do all the time than they are in what one or two big ones do occasionally.

A chap told me not long ago that it was no use for him to do anything for his town, because nobody ever appreciated it when he did. When I asked him how he knew that, he said, "well, nobody ever says anything about it." There are many people like him, they want a brass band to lead a parade in their honor every time they do something for the good of the

That makes me think of the old, time-worn story of the lady at her first baseball game, who expressed surprise at the yelling and cheering when a fielder caught a fly ball, saying, "Why this excitement? I thought that was what he was supposed to do."

Citizens are supposed to do those things that will build their community. Each is supposed to come "to bat" and at least make an attempt to hit-to play the game. They are supposed to support the community the same as they are supposed to support and furnish bread and butter for

A man does not expect the blare of trumpets every time he brings home a bag of groceries, but if he fails to do that his family will starve to death. And Snyder will get all thin and gaunt, hollow-eyed and weakkneed, puny and sickly looking, if you and all the other people in Snyder do not furnish the "groceries."

The sacks, bags, bottles and cans of community groceries are labled "pride," "gumption," "co-ordination" and "common-sense," without which any community will cease to grow-and in nature, business, or anything else,-to cease to grow is to perish.

When a town ceases to grow it dies on its feet, and not even the undertaker makes any money out of it; for there isn't even enough inspiration left to have a good funeral.

A dead town is a sorry sight, and the saddest part of it all is that we cannot lay our hands on the fellow who killed it. When you lie back, stall, alibi, pass the buck and refuse to "get behind and push," fail to provide the "groceries"—your town dies—it just dies and dies and dies, and you know and I know that when a town does




