Needless to say, Y Z made four odd at spades and thus won a rubber that many would have lost. If Z had not been alert and deduced that A was making a bluff bid, he would have played the hand at no trump and thus allowed A to make eight club tricks. It is a fine example of "calling the bluff."

All Bridge players of any experience know perfectly well that it is wiser to

play a hand with a sound suit as trumps than with no trumps—unless, to be sure, the no trumper is flawless and with no hole in it. Some hands, of course, do happen to work out better in no trumps, but these are the exception; anyhow, I think there is no real argument as to which is the better proposition—trumps or no trumps. It is, therefore, a strange

business that these self-same players will be seen time after time taking out

will be seen time after time taking out a suit into no trumps under the smallest provocation. As often as not declarers do this simply to enjoy the fun of playing the combined hands themselves; with these I have no quarrel—they are there to get what fun they may out of the game, but not the best results; and as that is their point of view about Bridge, why worry? With the rest I do find fault—in fact. I cannot understand their point

fact, I cannot understand their point of view at all, for they are not selfish, and they do want to get the best results; yet, knowing full well, as in their heart of hearts they must, that they are playing against their own interests, they still will bid — yes, and re-bid — their no trumps against partners' suits.

In sections where a one-sided food supply is the rule, the appetites of the tenants are satisfied by the customary diet. It is not easy to induce them to make changes or to add unaccustomed foods to their to add unaccustomed foods to their diet. For this reason, the sub-committee is preparing educational material in simple form to distribute through schools, stores, and other cooperating agencies. These leaflets will show why people should eat the foods recommended, and which foods give protection at least cost. Among the foods mentioned as good or excellent sources of the pellegra-preventative factor, are

good or excellent sources of the pellegra-preventative factor, are milk, lean muscle meat, liver, canned salmon, wheat germ, and pure dried yeast. Dried and canned milk are recommended when fresh milk can not be obtained. The market lists include also the cereals and dried legumes—on which low cost diets largely depend—vegetables and fruits to the greatest amount possible, fats, sweets, and some lean meats, fish and eggs. Food for children should differ in kind as well as in quantity from that of well as in quantity from that of adults, and the needs of other children differ somewhat from those of younger. Consequently particular attention has been given to tables showing how to provide for these



In terms of dollars, trucks this season have earned \$1,326,302.73 hauling their share of the crop to deep-water ports. Due to difference in rates, this means that the railroads this year have lost more than \$1,500,000 in revenue from one commodity alone

While the railroads were losing this revenue, they were paying an annual tax-bill to Texas which had mounted to more than \$10,000,000. They were carrying hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of feed stuffs to and from drought-stricken areas, either gratis or at rates which reflected substantial loss.

Because it is imperative that railroads maintain their properties in condition to meet the requirements of any emergency, these mounting tax bills and diminishing revenues constitute an unhealthy condition.

If present destructive competition is permitted to continue, it is inevitable that railroad properties will be so impaired as to prevent them rendering a necessary and expected public service. This is at least one of the reasons there has been so






