TEXAS SCHOOL tenth year, was of a family of the name of Hanks, some of whom now reside in Adams and others in Macon County, Illinois. My paternal grandfather, Abraham Lincoln, emigrated from Rockingham County, Virginia, to Kentucky about 1781 or 1782, where a year or two later he was killed by the Indians, not in battle, but by stealth, when he was laboring to open a farm in the forest. His ancestors, who were Quakers, went to Virginia from Berks County, Pennsylvania. An effort to identify them with the New England family of the same name ended in nothing more definite than similarity of Christian name in both families, such as Enoch, Levi, Mordecai, Solomon, Abraham, and the like.

THERE WERE some schools so-called, but no qualification was ever required of a teacher beyond "readin', writin' and cipherin'" to the Rule of Three. If a straggler supposed to understand Latin happened to sojourn in the neighborhood he was looked upon as a wizard. There was absolutely nothing to excite ambition for education. Of course, when I came of age I did not know much. Still, somehow, I could read, write and cipher to the Rule of Three, but that was all. I have not been to school since. The little advance I now have upon this store of education I have picked up of necessity.

"I was raised to farm work, which I continued till I was 22. At 21 I came to allinois. Macon County. Then I got to New Salem, at that time in Sangamon, now in Menard County, City Water Supply where I remained a year as a sort of clerk in a store. Then came the Black Hawk War; and I was elected a captain of volunteers, a success which gave me more pleasure than any I have had since. I went through the campaign; ran for the legislature (1832), and was beaten, the only time I ever have been beaten by the people. The next and three succeeding biennial elections I was elected to the legislature. I was not a candidate afterward. During this legislative period I had studied law, and removed to Springfield to practice it. In 1846 I was once elected to the lower house of Congress. Was not a candidate for re-election.

Heat and Feed Are What Baby Chicks Need, States Logan

Chicks Must Be Given **Attentve Care in** Early Life.

Four-H Club boys and girls who have chosen poultry as their club demonstration know they must take good care of the little chicks because weak, sickly, and dying chicks are disconraging. Now, taking care of baby chicks isn't such a delicate task; in fact, if you will remember the little rhyme, "Heat and feed are what chicks need," you will have the important rules.

The baby chick has just emerged from the warm shell, where it spent three weeks at a temperature of around 100 degrees under a hen or in the incubator. The old hen's way of raising chicks is to continue keeping them under her at the same temperature or thereabout. However, we have found artificially raised chicks less trouble. But we must keep the brooder stoves and hovers around 90 to 95 degrees the first week, and then it can be dropped five degrees, and in another two weeks it can be brought down to 80 degrees.

But you will want to know that the temperature is that on the floor, under the brooder, not up in the top goon. of the building. The room may feel

warm to us and then be cold to the chicks on the floor. It might be well gain the first few days to place a tin ring about 18 inches from the outside of
