

# IN SCURRY COUNTY

Seventh grade boys and girls in Sourry County rural schools have much encouragement to enter high school. Uniform county-wide seventh grade examinations have been given for three years with excellent results. son was at its peak, on May 23, 168 of these children received their diplomas at the county seventh grade rally at which Judge James P. Permanent pupil records are kept in the office of the county superintendent. This system makes it nossible for any child in any school in the county to secure a transcript of his work, thus aiding him materially in entering high school. These rec-

ords extend over the past six years. Progress in consolidation in Scurre County is such that it seems probable that every caild in the county except a few scattering ones in the ranching section, will soon have easy access to a four-year high school. Thirty-six rural schools have been group d into eight high school units. Three of these units have already been completed and the others are well under way. The Ira and the Flavanna consolidated districts have just finished new high school buildings. Ira at a cost all told of \$23,000 and Fluvanna at a cost of \$65,000.

# Scurry County Has Reduced Acreage in Cotton 5 Per Cent A cotton acreage reduction of six

per cent throughout the state of Texas was reported last week from the State Department of Agriculture, Scurry County's reduction is said by observers to be five per cent or more, which puts this section in line with the general reduction program throughout the state.

It is believed that the Scurry County condition is better than at most other points in the state, although the condition for West Texas is given as 79 per cent normal, the lowest of any section of the state. Probably more than 90 per cent of the crop, the average for Texas, was clean June 23, when the report was made.

"Stock ranges are in excellent condition because of recent rains, grass is fine and the livestock industry is improving," the report reads.


