School district awards roofing contracts

Muleshoe schools will be undergoing more than \$700,000 of roofing repairs this summer, one year after the hail storm reaked havoc throughout the district.

The Muleshoe Independent School District's Board awarded bids Tuesday for the individual roofing projects at each of the local schools during a regular bi-monthly

MISD architect Bill Adling, of Adling & Associates from Lubbock, met with the board Tuesday

to discuss the roofing project and proposed bids.

Adling said that right now there are two main goals, "First, that all of the projects are completed during the summer break so no contractors are on campus when school starts in the fall. Second, we want to get as much funding from the insurance settlement, hopefully 100 percent, to fund the project."

Each school was advertised as a separate project to try and ensure that the roofing repairs would be

completed during the summer was awarded to Advantage Conbreak.

After reviewing the bids and listening to the architect's advice, the trustees awarded the projects to the lowest bidders.

The job at Dillman Elementary was awarded to Lydick-Hooks Roofing Co. of Lubbock for \$187,463.

The job at DeShazo was awarded to Hartman Roofing Co. of San Angelo for \$155,265.

The job for Watson Junior High

tracting at a cost of \$238,000.

Advantage Contracting was also awarded the job at the high school for \$157,400, pending approval by the insurance company.

The school district has to check with the insurance company because one contractor did turn in a lower bid for the high school job, but just minutes before Tuesday's meeting the contractor notified the

The Coke executives did not even see Cameron's shirt and were not offended by the prank, said company spokeswoman Diana Garza.

MHS sweeps Rams

It took Muleshoe coach Brad Hill three years to record his first win against his alma mater. It took him just two hours to get his second one.

Muleshoe swept Portales 15-14, 7-5 in a doubleheader Friday at the city park field, with senior Rodney Alanis pitching a three-hitter in the second

"It's always nice to win against your old school," said Hill, a 1987 Portales grad. "But we're just trying to get better."

Muleshoe (7-5) needed a two-run rally in the bottom of the seventh inning to win the opener after squandering a fiverun lead.

Matt McClanahan tripled in the tying run and scored the game winner on a throwing error.

"We have to be more consistent," Hill said. "We showed some character again by coming back and winning the game. But we're not going to be able to do that against the good teams."

McClanahan and Ismael Nunez homered for the Mules, who banged out 18 hits against three Ram pitchers. It was McClanahan's fifth home run of the season and the first for

Nunez. Nunez, Alanis and Layne Kemp all had three hits for the Mules.

Kemp (4-2) picked up the win despite allowing 15 hits, seven for extra bases.

In the nightcap, Alanis held Portales hitless after the third inning. Alanis (2-2) walked five and hit four batters, but was able to wiggle out of trouble all night.

Trailing 3-0, Muleshoe scored five times in the fourth.

McClanahan drilled a basesloaded triple to center and B.J. Gonzales added a sacrifice fly.

The Rams tied the game with two unearned runs in the fifth inning.

Muleshoe took a 7-5 lead in the bottom of the fifth on singles by Aaron Purdy and Matt Mason and another sacrifice fly by

Purdy and James Barrett had two hits each for MHS.

That has huge implications to Texas farmers and ranchers looking for new markets for their products.

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

district that they wanted to revoke their bid due to a calculation error. The error put the proposed bid \$27,000 under the actual cost.

Adling explained that the school could deny the contractor's request to pull the bid and still grant the job to them at their originally proposed cost. The company would then have 10 days to turn down the contract and be forced to pay a fine if they did so.

Adling said that forcing the company to do the job at the proposed bid may cause problems and more work for the district in the long run.

Therefore, he recommended pulling the bid and granting the project to the next lowest bidder, which was Advantage Contracting. If the insurance company does not accept Advantage's bid, the school district will be forced to rebid the high school roofing project and start the selection process over.

In other business, the board approved the goals and objectives for the 1998-1999 school

Trustee Nick Bamert expressed concern that the performance on the TAAS test was the only measure of success currently in the policy. Bamert did not want to base a student's failure or passing to the next grade level based solely on one test. Moore reassured Bamert that other types of evaluation are used, but have not been built into the official objectives.

Bamert was joined by Moore and the other trustees in agreeing that they may want to consider revising the policy for future school years to include the other forms of assessment used by teachers in the district.

Motorcycle rally draws large crowd

Motorcyclists from five states invaded Muleshoe Saturday for the 16th annual Muleshoe Roadriders Motorcycle Rally.

The increasing popularity of motorcycles combined with good weather helped draw a larger crowd than in past years, rally organizer Danny Dickerson said.

"Ours is the first rally of the year," Dickerson said. "Everybody is ready to get out and ride."

Dickerson says the rally was evidence of the wide variety of people currently riding motorcycles.

"We have a lot of elderly people, a lot of Christian motorcyle cassociation members and hardcore bikers," Dickerson said. "We have doctors, lawyers, police officers - all different walks of life, young and old.

Motorcycle enthusiasts came from Wyoming, Kansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, and throughout Texas to participate in the rally.

Robert Green traveled 250 miles from Elk City, Okla. This is his 34th year riding motorcycles and his ninth year at the Muleshoe rally.

For riders like Green, motorcycles are a family tradition.

" My dad was riding before I was born, so when I got old enough, I picked up on it and have been with it ever since," Green said.

Norma Navarre came from Sealy, near Houston, to display her motorcycles. She has attended rallies as far away as Gunnison, Colo., more than 1,200 miles from Sealy.

Navarre says she attends as many rallies as possible.

"I try to make at least two a month," she said.

The rally can also be fun for people unfamiliar with motorcycles, Dickerson said.

Several races are held to test riders' skills. Among these is a flow race, in which the rider who takes the longest amount of time to finish the race course without stopping

Another race challenges participants ability to hit a hockey puck while on the back of a motorcycle.

If the excitement of these competitions and the camaraderie of being with fellow bikers is not enough to attract people to the rally, Dickerson uses a secret weapon - flower power.

Muleshoe suffered a 32-26 first-round loss Friday to tournament champion Shallowater.


Shallowater beat Olton 36-24 in the championship game Saturday and earned a berth in the national tournament later this month.

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
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Aguirre ties for 7th at state

In the Roman province of Judea, around the fourth year of the rule of Pontius Pilate, a man was led outside the walls of the city of Jerusalem to his execution. To the authorities, he may have been a politically dangerous social reformer, a radical, an apocalyptic firebrand whose message about the coming of the "Kingdom of God" was a threat to the peace of Rome. It was met with swift force.

THE FIRST CHRISTIANS

Born in a suburban village and exposed to the cosmopolitan life of Roman cities, Jesus of Nazareth grew up in a hotbed of radicalism and political activism, eventually becoming a preacher. His message was characterized by simple metaphor, targeted to the agrarian populace. It was there, among the ordinary people, that he built a devoted following.

"From Jesus to Christ: The First Christians," a four-hour Frontline special, explores the life of Jesus and the movement he started, challenging familiar assumptions and conventional notions about the origins of Christianity. Drawing upon new and sometimes controversial historical evidence and interviews with the nation's leading New Testament scholars, the series transports the viewer back two thousand years to the time and place where Jesus once lived and preached. The film traces Jesus' life, focusing on the events that occurred after he died and on his first followers, the men and women whose belief, conviction, and martyrdom created a major movement that transformed the Roman Empire in the space of only three hundred years.

The series is divided into four one-hour segments:

"Pax Romana" traces the life of Jesus, exploring the message that helped his ministry grow and the events that led to his crucifixion. This first hour looks at how scholars and archaeologists have pieced together a new portrait of where Jesus was born, how he lived, and who he was.

The second hour, "A Light to the Nations," turns from the life of Jesus to the period that followed his death, examining the rise of Christianity and concluding with the First Revolt — the bloody and violent siege of Jerusalem and the beginning of a rift between Christianity and Judaism.

"Let the Reader Understand," part three, examines the period after the First Revolt, tracing the development and impact of the Gospels, and looking at the increasingly hostile relationship between the Christians and the Jews.

The final hour, "Kingdoms in Conflict," examines the extraordinary events of the second and third centuries in which Christianity grew from a small Jewish sect to an official religion of the Roman Empire.

"From Jesus to Christ: The First Christians" on Frontline will be broadcast in two 2-hour blocks on consecutive evenings, Monday and Tuesday, April 6th — 7th at 9:00 p.m. Individual hour-long episodes of the series will be broadcast Saturdays at 11:00 p.m. beginning April 11th on KENW-TV.

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

Kamal Bhakta placed first. Bhakta had to answer 60 questions in a maximum of two hours dealing with biology, chemistry and phys-






