As a result, a few of the standard breeders of good poultry and representatives of the Scurry County Chamber of Commerce met in Snyder a few days ago and decided to have a show December 18 and 19, just to work up interest in better poultry.

If we should make a good crop next year we would be in a position to have a real show, as we have had in the past. Past records will show that Scurry County has had some of the best poultry in the state.

This show will not cost any exhibitor one penny. There will be no entry charge, and all you have to do is bring in your exhibit. will be placed in a suitable coop, fed and cared for free of charge. The committee on finance will arrange some suitable premiums, with ribbons, just to make the show a little more interesting

We especially appeal to those who are desirous of keeping the standard of better breeding stock up in Scurry County by exhib-iting something to help out. If you expect to sell eggs for hatching in the spring, this will be a good place to show what you will have to offer

We are arranging to have the show judged according to the standard of perfection as nearly as possible, then have a different judge to pass on the entire show for egg production. This arrangement surely will give all an equal showing at all honors, if you do not have anything but a striped pullet to show, so come on and let's see who has standard stuff, also egg producers. Three hundred and sixty-four days in a year, a half pound wouldn't make much difference between Deputy Sheriff Horace more definite plans for 1932 soon Leath and Sleepy-eye Blakey.
