Former Snyder Boy Writes of Lake Journey As "One of Rare Vistas"

Horace Rhoades, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Rhoades of Snyder, recently took a trip through the lake country of California, which he calls "one of rare vistas."

Leaving Los Angeles in the wee, small hours, driving a 65 horsepower Pike's Peak motor Willys Six from the Overland Texarkana Company, we were rolling merrily up the Owens Valley highway north of Bishop when I saw heralded his coming by rounding the crest of Mt. Whitney (14,996 feet elevation) with a pinkish glow.

Over the Sherwin Grade and through the giant pine forest of Deadman's Pass, the Willys Six was seen flashing along the shore of Mono Lake with its dainty islands, white Pahoa and black Negit, looking even more spectral in the dawn light...

Through Pine-Clad Hills. Through pretty pine-clad hills, around sheer craggy ridges, the road winds above rushing rapids and placid pools of the river and high along the edge of Topaz Lake. The latter is a sizable body of water in a pretty scenic setting distinguished for its white pelicans and big trout, both of which may be seen from the highway.

first quarter, and that second quarter was about even. Byrle Rigby, crack halfback, was out of the game.

But that second half! Except when Kelly heaved a long pass to Wilson, who streaked to the 1-yard line before being downed from behind, the local defense was just about ironclad.

Despite their overwhelming last-half whipping, the Buffaloes displayed their usual fight to the end. Epley returning a kick-off to the 40 yard line on next to the last play of the game.

The field was in perfect shape and the day was ideal for the fairing of local and visiting fans, as well as for the pigskin boys.

Two 12 yard plunges by Kelly and one 11 yard sprint by the shifty Wilson contributed much toward keeping the ball in Snyder territory during the first few minutes of play.

Snyder was able to make a first down after kickoff but then forced to punt. Wilson went off tackle for 14 yards. A 15 yard penalty during the first few minutes of play.

Snyder Makes One. Theo Rigby hit the line for 3 yards. A Stanton 15 yard penalty sent the ball to the 7 yard line.

Jesse Browning threw Wilson for a 4 yard loss on the first play after kickoff, and Stanton punted. After an exchange of punts, it was Snyder's ball on the 50 yard line.

The next touchdown sally was featured by a 20 yard pass, McClinton to Jenkins, and a first down on three line plays, but Howell fumbled and Stanton recovered.
