Voting Runs High In 1928 and 1930 County Elections

Scurry County voters were aithful to the ballot box in 1928 nd in 1930, figures for those two lection years reveal.

In 1928 the county polled a toal of 2,786 votes. That was a presidental election year, of course, and interest was also ranning high in several county and district races. The year 1930 brought out poll

tax payers amounting to 2,860, but it was thought that not more than 2,500 ballots would be cast. The surprisingly large turnout, however, hoisted the total fig-ures to about 2,800, W. L. Gross, county surveyor, polling the most votes of any candidate-2,753. In the governor's race in 1930, Clint Small was easily leader in this county, with 1011 bollots. Mrs. Ferguson was runner-up with 631, and Thomas B. Love was given 435 votes. Earle B. Mayfield was fourth, with 264, and Sterling was fifth, with 101. Allred was given almost as many votes—1101—as his thre Becker who is running again this year, polled only 124 votes.

Seeking the Office on Her

TO VOTERS OF SCURRY COUNTY:

I am asking for a first regular term as County Judge, not upon indefinite promises, but upon my record for rigid economy and tax re-

Since I assumed the duties of County Judge, nine months ago, the running expense of the county, as evidenced by the general fund, has been steadily reduced and taxes lowered. This general fund expense for the year of 1930 average \$3,448.78 per month; for the first nine month of 1931, the average was \$2,564.73 per month, or a reduction of \$884.05 per month. For the last three months of 1931 and the first six months of 1932 (my tenure of office) the average was \$1,717.14 per month, or a further reduction of \$847.59 per month. The above figures were tabulated from the records of the County Clerk, which records show a larger percentage of reduction in the running expense of the county for my nine months in office than for any like period in the history of Scurry County.

Expenses have been reduced in many ways, only a few of which space will permit me to mention. Probably of most importance is the fact that we simply quit buying. The enormous charity demands have been held to a minimum by an organization created for the purpose and which could and did make a careful investigation of each case. The burial situation has been handled by the County manufacturing a substantial and nicely finished casket and furnishing other necessities, thus saving the enormous charges of the undertakers. Two of these caskets are in the basement of the court house, and I invite you to see them.

The Commissioners' Court recently reduced the pay for the feed and care of prisoners from 90 cents per day for each prisoner to 60 cents per day for each prisoner. This reduction is in keeping with reductions made by other counties, and the Court thought the reduction justified since more than half of the families in Scurry County are being fed on less than 60 cents per day. I mention these instances of reduction out of the many for the reason that misstatements have been made concerning them, not by my opponent, but by others.

The Commissioners' Court has just completed its duties as a Board of Equalization and reduced valuations from \$6,685.100 for 1931 to \$5,693,-520 for 1932, a reduction of \$991,580, or nearly one million dollars. This is the largest tax reduction that has ever been made in one year in the history of Scurry County. The County could not stand a larger reduction this year for the reason that the bonded indebtedness of the county is, in round numbers, one-half million dollars, which debt is a lien against the County and it cannot be legally or in honesty repudiated. More than 60 per cent of the revenue provided is necessary to pay interest and provide sinking funds. If valuations should be reduced to the extent that revenue would not be provided to pay the County's debts, then the interest will compound and the debts grow larger and the County go deeper in debt. It shall be my policy, so long as I am your County Judge, to keep this County from going deeper in debt and I shall, with the help of the Commissioners' Court, gradually bring her out of debt by rigid economy in expenditures and sound business policies.

If I am honored with a full term, I shall continue to reduce expens d to lower taxes.





Higher Fees For **Mailing Services**

Effective early this month, a new and higher schedule of post office nsurance fees, collect-on-delivery fees, and money order fees was laid down by the recent revenue bill assed by Congress.

The new rates on these items are given as follows by Mrs. Gladys M. inderson, postmistress:

Insurance fees: Five cents on \$5 ndemnity, 10 cents on \$25, 15c on 25 cents on \$100, 30 cents on \$150, 35 cents on \$200.

Collect-on-Delivery Fees: Twelve cents fee on \$5 indemnity, 17 cents on \$25, 22 cents on \$50, 32 cents on \$100, 40 cents on \$150, 45 cents on

Registry Fees: Fifteen cents fee on \$5 indemnity, 18 cents on \$25, cents on \$300, 60 cents on \$400, 70 cents on \$500, 80 cents on \$600, 85 cents on \$700, 90 cents on \$800, 95 cents on \$900, \$1 on \$1,000.

Money Order Fees: From 1 cent to \$2.50, 6 cents fee; from \$2.51 to \$5, 8 cents; from \$5.01 to \$10, 11 cents; from \$10.01 to \$20, 13 cents; from \$20.01 to \$40, 15 cents; from \$40.01 to \$60, 18 cents; from \$60.01 to \$80, 20 cents; from \$80.01 to \$100, 22 cents.

TAX ASSESSOR SCURRY COUNTY

Candidate for Re-Election

To the Voters of Scurry County:

Being your assessor, and with the responsibility of carrying on the duties of the office, I have not had the opportunity of being out a great deal. However, I made an effort to see each voter at the time I was working outside and solicit your support. I am sure that the voters of our county understand my position, and trust that you will appreciate my attitude, that is, to first take care of the duties of the office to which you have intrusted me. There are just a few things that I would like to mention. During my enure of office I have personally carried on the work of the office, using but very little help. Someone has asked the question, "What determines the values of property?" My answer is: Study the tax values of the different counties of the state and try and keep our county in line with values of other counties of the state in accordance with their values-more particularly neighboring counties-but keep the state as a whole in mind, as we all send state taxes to Austin; and if you do not you are likely to get your

That is one of the reasons I recommended to our 1931 Commissioners' Court to lower our values in place of lowering our county rate. This year I asked for a reduction in our values. I did not get all that I asked for, but compromised on a 10 per cent reduction. Speaking of working with the Court, you will always find me at their service when passing

There are a lot of things about our tax system that I think should be changed: First, If we are to keep our old system, I think our tax assessors and Commissioners' Courts should have a more systematic and accurate way of arriving at values. Second, I think our Legislature should enact laws shifting the burden of taxes from our real property, thereby encouraging home ownership, which is a very vital thing to good citizenship. In the small countries it is not as a very vital thing to good citizenship. ship. In the small counties it is not so noticeable, but in the larger counties and cities there are millions of dollars worth of busine wealth that escape taxation under our present system.

You have made it possible for me to accumulate quite a bit of experience and knowledge in tax matters, more particularly concerning Scurry County. As humbly as I can say it, I do not think that the job belongs to me or that I am the only fellow who can do the work, but I feel that with my past experience I can render you a service in the future better than I have in the past. My services have always been willingly at your command and with pleasure. If you see fit to honor me with this office another term, my services will continue as in the past, to the very best of my ability.


