MERRITT TO BE IN RUN-OFF FOR AUSTIN OFFICE

Dickens County Man Ranks First Incomplete Returns Disclose-Sentell Runs Third.

Incomplete returns from five of the six counties composing the 118th representative district, and complete returns from Scurry County, indi-cate that Joe A. Merritt will enter the run-off with Fred C. Haile for a seat in the lower house of the Legislature. Haile led the field of five candidates while Sentell. Brady and Outlaw are said to have finished in the order named, behind Merritt

Merritt lacked only 102 votes in Scurry County of leading all his opponents combined, his total mounting to 1,084. He also was given a substantial lead in Borden County.

Haile led by a wide margin in Dickens County, where he makes his home, with Sentell in second place there. The Spur man took substantial leads, also, in Stonewall and Kent Counties, where it is understood that Brady ran second. Outlaw led the field in his home county, Garza, by a substantial margin

The Dickens County man has never before been a candidate for public office. Merritt served three terms in the representative's place from this district.

CROWDS COME TO SPEAKINGS

Candidates spoke Thursday and Friday nights to hundreds of Scurry County people who were more interested than the candidates believed in how Saturday's races would turn out.

Threatening weather forced county candidates to go to the district court room Thursday night. The room was filled to overflowing from the time the candidates began introducing themselves until Curnutte and Sentell, candidates for county judge, concluded their 15-minute talks
