

The new survey leads through the pose. same portion of Hermleigh as the old route, but at the city limits it continues in a straight line rather than curving to cross the Santa Fe. It takes a beeline down the west side of the Santa Fe, crosses the R. S. & P. tracks about a mile from the Hermleigh city limits, then follows the electric high line in a beeline to within about two miles of the Snyder city limits

The second R. S. & P. crossing will be four miles east of Snyder. The route follows the north side of high line. After leaving th high line, the road will angle to the south side of the Santa Fe on the east edge of town. It just misses the elbow turn on Highway No. 101 on the corner of the S. J. Littlepage place

From the city limits the survey leads just south of the old cemetery taking a slice from the R. E. Gray place. It also slices the next two blocks, both of them partially va cant, and strikes the old route just east of Bell's Flower Shop.
