Three Busses at Pyron. The Pyron independent district now has two school owned busse and, another, privately owned, will be put into operation as soon as the body can be completed. The Lone Wolf district consolidated with Pyron two years ago. Total number of students transported will reach approximately 100 when the third bus is ready. The Lone Star district of Fisher County has transferred for the second consecutive year into the Pyron school. The school now has nine teachers and offers 11 grades of work. Pyron and Ira, while not being affiliated, are each seeking classification this year. At present there are two private

y owned busses bringing about 85 students to the Snyder school. The Woodard school transferred its entire scholastic enumeration to Snyder for this year.

Thus at present there are 14 school owned and three privately owned busses in operation and another to be put into service in the near future. These busses travel approximately 730 miles per day and carry 734 pupils to and from school. It is safe to say if this method of transportation were not available at least 500 of these now in a larger school system would be in a one or two-teacher school, and few of this number would be enabled to get a high school educa-

Various and exaggerated reports have been made as to the cost of operation of these busses. To the best of my information all the busses of the county will average less than \$100 each per year for fuel. It has been said that some of these make their runs about half of the time. Anyone keeping i touch with this phase of our school can easily refute this. Reports from school officials are that rarely are conditions or need for repairs serious enough to keep them from going for more than one trip at a





It is a legitimate question, this new one. If the Lone Star Gas Company and its subsidiaries are placng advertising in Texas newspapers for the purpose of influencing the newspaper publishers or anyone ise politically, there probably should be a law, as he wags would say.

But the facts reveal that Railroad Commission auditors spent over a year in examining Lone Star vouchers, advertising copy and other such material. the week. There is only a blanket reference to these materials n the commission's final report, and it seems to The Times to be based on prejudice . . . possibly on political expediency on the part of the commissioners hemselves.

This Scurry County newspaper publishes utilities advertising regularly-for the gas company, the elecric company, the telephone company, the ice company. Month in and month out, the combined utilities bills for the newspaper office and the homes of its publishers run far higher than the advertising revenues derived from the utiliies companies

If this be subsidized advertising, then the honorable Railroad Commission has added a new definition to this world of changing economic relatonships.






