### At Least One Acre Of Sudan Suggested Per Head of Stock

With plenty of land for living at nome in the form of retired cotton and wheat acres, farmers should plant at least one acre of sudau


on the farm, it is pointed cut by extension service specialists at Texas A. & M. College. March, April and May are the chief months for planting this greatest of all Texas grazing crops, they say. At least one-eighth acre of sudan should be planted for each hog, and at least

Sudan pasture should if possible be shells out of every three used on fenced hog-proof to get the most out of it. Sudan grass does better as a rule if planted in 2 to 3 foct rows at the week in working out projects for rate of 5 to 10 pounds of seed per acre. The land should be prepared as for corn, cotton or grain sor chums. An ordinary planter with a sorghum plate is satisfactory for the commissioners admit that they seeding the crop.
