HOME DEMONSTRATION NOTES

Making 100 Feet of Tile. Making 100 feet of tile is the work that Mrs. C. R. Leslie is doing as a member of the Home Demonstration Club.

Canning Budget Planned. A canning budget which calls for 283 containers of vegetables, fruits and fruit juices, jellies, preserves and pickles is the thing which Mrs. L. E. Rea is doing as garden demonstrator of the Home Demonstration Club.

An adequate amount and variety to provide Mrs. Rea's family for four non-productive winter months and two non-productive summer months for a balanced diet, will be furnished by the filling of her pantry shelves with this amount of canned foods.

Fall Garden Planned. An early fall garden sub-irrigated by concrete tile is being planned by Mrs. C. E. Roberson, garden demonstrator of the Bell Home-demonstration Club, which will have in it tomatoes, okra, squash, cucumbers, peppers, beans, black-eyed peas and cantaloupes.

Mrs. Roberson will include in her canning some of the following varieties which are particularly adapted to this section of the state and which produce quality products at the same time: Detroit Dark Red, Pinks, Pinto and Refugee beans, Danvers Half Long cukes, Chicago Pickling and Boston Pickling cucumbers, Green Curled Siberian Kale, Big Boston Iceberg lettuce, Bloomsdale Savoy and New Zealand spinach, White Velvet okra, White Bermuda onions, Ruby King peppers, Singapore turnips, McGee, Mar globe and New Stone tomatoes for late bearing, and Eschiana and Jean Pink tomatoes for early bearing.

Texas Cowboy Reunion at Stamford Will Attract Thousands July 2-3-4

Three rodeo performances daily will be staged this year during the Texas Cowboy Reunion, July 2, 3 and 4 at Stamford. A morning matinee has been added at one-half the adult price of admission to the regular afternoon and night performances.

W. G. Swenson, president, believes this will be an added convenience to the crowds attending the reunion, relieving the congestion that has resulted in the past from the great crowds attending the afternoon show. It will also give all of the cowboy contestants in the rodeo an opportunity to perform before the crowds.

Mr. Swenson has also called attention of visitors to the advantages of attending the night performances. The arena is so well lighted that the performers may be seen as well as in daylight and at the same time the spectators have the comfort of the cool night air.

The morning matinee will start at 9:00 a. m. each day and the regular performances at 2:15 p. m. and 8:00 p. m. Low admission prices are being maintained, some of the tickets being slightly lower than last year.

Besides the additional performance to accommodate the increasing crowds at the rodeo, a new grandstand of approximately 1,000 seats has been added this year.

More Than \$3,000 Prizes. Rodeo prizes are more generous than ever before. Besides the cash prizes such as have been given for daily winners in the past, six saddles and other premiums are being given to champions in the various events this year. The total prize list will amount to over \$3,000.

Rodeo events include the cutting-horse contest, oldtimers calf-roping, steer riding for juniors and the usual cowboy contests—bronc-riding, steer-riding, wild cow milking and calf-roping.

The rodeo is the attraction around which is built a continuous program of entertainment for the three days and nights of the reunion.
