ABILITY vs. POLITICS

An East Texas Vacancy-Hunter Vies With Able, Trained Official For Land Commissioner's Post (From Antin Statesman)

J. H. WALKER, seeking re-election, as Texas land commissioner, has a third of a century's experience and training in the land office.

He has as his opponent, in this week's primary, Walter E. Jones of Gregg county.

Mr. Jones' public service has been as county surveyor. Besides holding that local office, he has been connected with an engineering firm concerned with land surveys.

He has made many surveys, asserting the existence of vacancies, on which the land office during the next two years would normally have to pass.

Land Commr. Walker has stated the issue of his race this way: "The opposition to me in this campaign grows out of my refusal to sell to applicants for vacancies land which rightfully belongs to the people, or which Texas people had a preference to buy."

"The question before you is whether you wish to start a 'recovery' program in the land office that will disturb every home in Texas. Under my administration, with the assistance of the attorney general's department, the state has acquired 110 oil wells in East Texas for the school fund, and no citizen has been harmed."

The voters' choice is between Commr. Walker, an able official of long experience, and Mr. Jones, a minor county office-holder. The choice is easy. (Political Advertising)

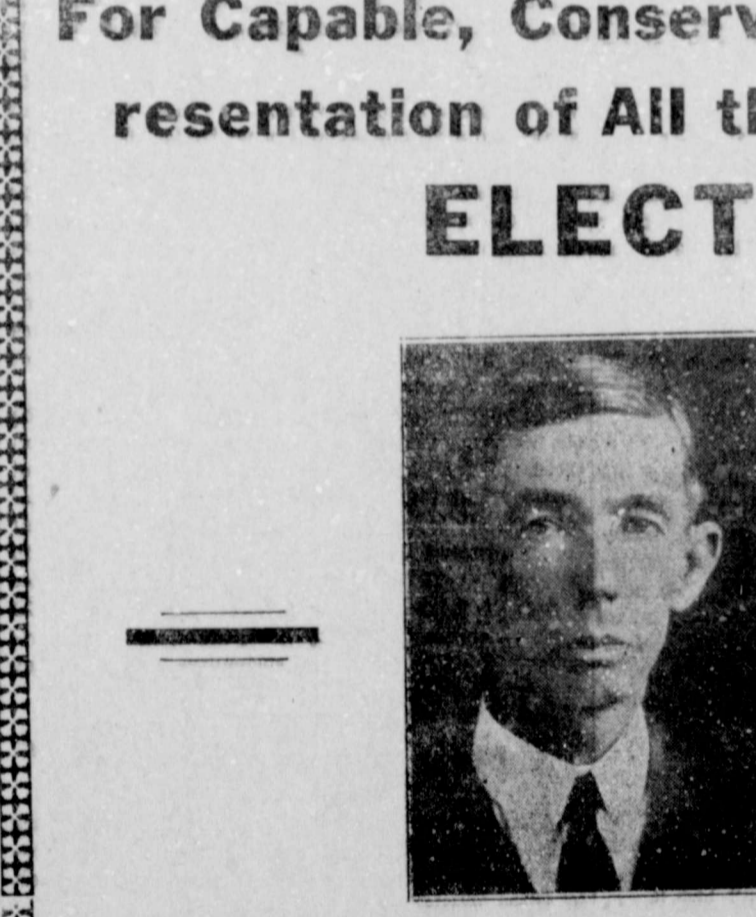
TO THE VOTERS OF PRECINCT 4.

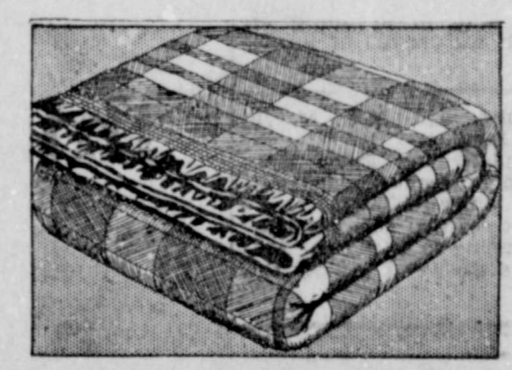
