## Drought has local farmers worried about future

Emergency loans are not the answer to the record-breaking drought in Texas, according to several local farmers.
Last week, President Clinton announced that disaster assistance would be made available to farmers through low-interest loans.
The loans, made throughthe Farm Service Agency, would be available ServicoAge ney, wowld available
fered a loss of 30 percent or more on any single crop. Qualifying producers must be creditworthy, unable to obtain credit elsewhere, and have adequate collateral to secure the loan. It would just put me further in debt - if I was even eligible for a oan," said West Camp farmer Kevin Grant, one of a half-dozen farmers who met with the Journal for an nformal round table discussion last week "YOu can't borow yours out of debt."

Facing its second extended drought in three years, the group is worried not only about their future but about the future of the whole farming community in general
"For a lot of farmers, this is going o be it," Grant said. "And there is nobody to replace them."
The Texas Agricultural Extension Service estimates that total losses to Texas farmers and ranchers could total more than $\$ 4.6$ billion as the drought continues.

And despite a few teasing showers the last few days, there appears to be no end in sight to the drought. The National Weather Service predicts a high probability of continued drought throughout the rest of the growing season

This is the hottest, driest summer I can ever remember, and I've been here all my life," said Lewis Wayne Shafer, who farms in the Needmore community.
"You know there are going to be
years like this, but the profit is so meager nowadays it's hard to make enough money to make it through the hard years," said Jerry Nichols, who farms about nine miles southof Muleshoe.
"Farming used to be fun," said Nichols, who was able to put three children through college farming. He wonders if he would be able to do it today.
