ON TEXAS FARMS

By Minnie Fisher Cunningham, Extension Service Editor

Planting cowpeas, terracing and crop rotation enabled Byron Sect, Rains County farmer, to produce eight 600-pound bales of cotton on 12 acres even in a drought year, according to Roy King, farm demonstration agent, under whose guidance Mr. Scott carries on his soil rebuilding, moisture and conservation program.

Drouth may have affected some people's food supplies but the members of the Greenville, Irairie Hill and Latium home demonstration clubs in Washington County reported 9,165 containers of fruits and fruit juices, vegetables, meats, pickles, jams, jellies and preserves on their pantry shelves and fall vegetables yet to can.

As a part of their clothing work 250 home demonstration club women in Cherokee County report that they have made 165 foundation patterns and by them made 225 dresses and slits; built 25 new clothes closets and remodeled 100; made four sleeve pressing boards and two shoe racks.

Pooling and planting more than 100 acres of cabbage for carlot shipment, 114 members of the Galveston County Truck Growers' Association are doing their bit to supply the country with green food this winter. Copenhagen Market and Golden Acre are the varieties being planted. A Kansas City firm has bargained for the output.

The Burleson County farm demonstration, G. C. King, has brought it right home to the farmers in his county that terracing means money in the pocket. A questionnaire sent to 300 farmers for whom he has run lines for terracing asked: "Did the terraced acres of your farm produce more than the un-terraced acres?" The reply was 100 per cent yes. Coming down to brass tacks, Mr. King asked: "How much?" Replies for the cotton acreage showed an average increase of 97 pounds of seed cotton per acre. Those for corn showed a six bushel increase per acre.

Clearing the way for county wide activity on the improved bedroom demonstration this winter, home demonstration club women of Calhoun County have designated for an imaginary bonfire many useless objects once prized but now deteriorated and classed as "dust catchers." Among these are old paper flowers, certain types of pillows, door steps, old calendars, and disabled plaster of paris animals.

California Passes This State in Her Population Totals

From the Literary Digest: Since its annexation in 1845 Texas has consistently gained in population rank among its sister commonwealths. It reached fifth place in 1910, held it in 1920 and 1930. But the 1933 Census Bureau population estimates show that California has outstripped Texas. The ranking now is New York, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Ohio, California (6,062,000), Texas (6,023,000).

Patriotic Texans are all asking: "Can California stay ahead?" In neighboring Oklahoma a newspaper suggests that this humiliating estimate will be forgotten if Texas catches up with California before the 1940 census.

The favorite suggestion of The Texas Weekly and Texas dailies is that Texas try to attract population by a grand and glorious celebration of Texas independence in 1936.

The Florida Times-Union has promised that the other Southern States will help her, and indeed "will generally do whatever is possible to help Texas get back its place in the list."

Favorable factors cited in Texas press talk are the fact that 85 per cent of all native Texans live in Texas today and that Texas apparently has considerable lead over California in the number of people under 20 years of age. The obvious conclusion is that with all these young people and with the Texan habit of staying in Texas, the young married couples of the Lone Star State will attend to California in the next few years.

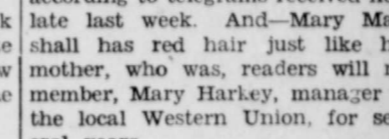
LAST GRIDIRON GAME PLANNED
