MANY SCHOOL **IMPROVEMENTS** START MOVING

Pyron Gymnasium and Auditorium Begins This Week-End; Other Projects Under Way.

A combined gymnasium and auditorium, work on which is set to begin this week-end at Pyron school, is the leading work relief project for county schools that is under way or on the horizon.

The Pyron structure will be built largely of native rock, which can be obtained two to four miles from the campus, Superintendent T. B. Bownds reports. It will be 60x100 feet, with a stage in one end, dressing rooms and a commodious gym Meat floor. Plans call for completion of the building within 60 days. Final approval of the project came Tues. day of this week.

Many Garments Made. Clothing work has consisted in making of 82 foundation patterns. at regular meetings at which 13 method demonstrations were given by agent, and at other club meetings, and home visits, a two-day training school held September 3 and 4, attended by 22 club women, was the beginning of clothing work in the county. Forty dresses, three coats, three slips and one pair pajamas have been made using the foundation pattern as a basis for cutting.

With 4-H girls' work, bedroom improvement has been carried on since September. Twelve clubs have been given 27 method demonstrations in relation to that phase of work. Forty-seven articles have been made to improve their storage space, and one bedroom demonstrator in preparation for 1935 work has provided a dressing unit and painted two pieces of furniture.






