FARMERS MAY GET FACTS ON TANNING HIDES

Extension Service Leather Specialist To Demonstrate Here Monday And Tuesday.

Farmers, ranchers and others who wish to get first-hand information about tanning leather or making leather goods are invited to attend the demonstrations and talks to be brought here Monday and Tuesday afternoons by M. K. Thornton, leather specialist of the Extension Service.

The Monday meeting will begin at 9:00 o'clock in the morning, and the demonstration will continue into the afternoon and through a part of the following day. Anyone interested in having hides used in the demonstrations may contact the county agent.

The leather specialist has conducted similar demonstrations in a number of Texas counties. "He is both interesting and highly skilled in his work," County Agent W. R. Lace said yesterday, "and no one will regret setting aside several hours for this unusual work."

Continuation of **Reduced** Rate on West Texas Feed

The Commodities Purchase Section of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration has informed Congressman George Mahon that an agreement has been reached with railroad officials and approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission, which will make possible a continuation of the reduced rates on shipments of livestock feed for the drouth area. The agreement which made possible these reduced rates during the hast few months expired May 31, C. A. Franks Dies and Mr. Mahon had been working with this section and with the Interstate Commerce Commission on this proposition for several weeks. The new agreement provides a basis of two-thirds of the regular rate to apply on hay, and 50 per cent of the hay rates on other feed shipments. The agreement took effect June 5 and will continue until August 31. The destination territory to which the reduced rates apply includes Scurry County. Franks resided in 131 counties in five mid-western states, 60 of which are in West Texas. Scurry and Borden are included.




day of the Texas Farm Debt Conciliation Committee, according to Guion Gregg, district supervisor, who was in Snyder early this week. Similar meetings will be held at Lubbock Friday of next week, and at Paducah Wednesday of next week. All sessions will be in the courthouses at 2:30 p. m. Gregg's territory, known as state District No. 1, embraces 56 West Texas counties, with headquarters at Lubbock.

The meetings will be held in an effort to acquaint farmers, civic leaders and others interested in the farm debt question, of the service that is available through the state committee, which is an agency of the Farm Credit Administration. Leaders in the district meetings will include a Washington representative, who will assist R. J. Murray, state chairman. A representative of the Federal Land Bank will also be present.

Newly appointed conciliation committeemen for Scurry County, just announced by Governor Allred, are as follows: Ben F. Smith, chairman; Joe Caton and H. P. Winters. These comitteemen, along with the old county committee, county agent, secretary-treasurer of the National Farm Loan Association, and farmers who wish to have their debts adjusted are especially invited to the zone meetings, the district supervisor said.

This special pool will close in about four months. It is being organized to supply surplus tags in regions where cotton will soon be picked.

Since May 12, 1933, when the Farm Credit Administration was established, the Federal Land Bank of Houston, acting for itself and as agent for the Land Bank commisioner, has made 42,738 loans aggregating \$129,192,350.00. This is almost as large as the amount of business carried on the books of the bank on May 1, 1933, after 17 years of operation. The interest rate reduction provided by the act will affect only Federal Land Bank loans, all of which are first mortgage loans. The interest rate on Land Bank commisioner loans, which are made on either first or second mortgages on farm property, will emain unchanged at 5 per cent.
