DEATH CLAIMS H. P. WELLBORN AT HOME HERE

Landowner, Banker, and Former Sheriff Had Lived in County More Than 50 Years.

H. P. Wellborn, 72, resident of this section for more than 50 years and an early-day sheriff and commissioner of Scurry County, died at his home in Southwest Snyder early Saturday morning following health of more than two years.

Funeral rites for the landowner and former banker were held Sunday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock from the First Baptist Church, with Rev. J. W. McGaha, a long-time friend, Rev. Lawrence Hays, local pastor, and Rev. Orald Cary, young preacher whom Mr. Wellborn had ssisted in getting an education, officiating. Odom Funeral Home was in charge of burial in Snyder cemetery.

Sheriff for Six Years.

Mr. Wellborn was elected sheriff of Scurry County in 1892, about three years after he had moved from Brown County and settled on a claim 17 miles southwest of here. in what is now the Bison-Knapp community. He served as sheriff for six years and later as a county ommissioner from Precinct No. 3. After serving in the sheriff's office e became a special Texas Ranger or several years.

In the early days Mr. Wellborn was a banker and also managed his land interests, which gradually grew to large proportions in the Knapp area. Later, he was first vice president and a director of the First State Bank & Trust Com-

Saturday Was Hottest Day of 1935, Committee Asks With 107 Degrees; Showers Cool Things Off.

Boiling down figures gleaned from the records of Mrs. Wesley Evans, government weather tabulator, we find that 67 days in 1934 had a maximum temperature of 100 or above. So far, 1935 has produced only 11 days during which the mercury went 100 degrees or over.

It Couldn't Be as Hot. Even if all the remaining summer

days of 1935 were to be dripping with 100-degree perspiration, well than a third as many really hot days this year as we had last year. Last Saturday tied for the honor of being the hottest day of 1935 in 107 that day. The same figure was hit July 13. June produced one scorcher, the 21st, with 102-degree weather. Seven July days-8th

through 13th-registered 101 degrees or above. So far, August has seen such hot weather only thrice -102 last Friday, 107 Saturday and 102 Sunday. Showers and threats of showers in various parts of the county broke

Trench Silo Survey.

In a survey of trench silo work in Texas recently, an Extension Service news report says:

"Trench silos are getting filled this month in Texas. Corn, red top cane, seeded ribbon cane, hegari, kafir, milo and a few more such crops are going into them.

Plenty of Feed Space. "A trench silo six feet wide at

the top, four feet wide at the bottom, five feet deep and 100 feet long, will hold 30 tons of silage. That makes three tons per cow for a 10-cow herd. Eudaly says three tons is just about what a dairy cow

"But that isn't all. Each cow should be supplied with one ton of hay and one of fed per yar. He says cannily, Remember, the more roughage the cow will consume, the less of grain mixture will be required. Hay and silage are cheaper than corn and cottonseed meal.

"On a recent trip to the gulf coast territory spreading the gospel of trench silos or 'canning the cow's winter food supply,' Eudaly found that Refugio County had only one trench silo. Since he spoke there two months ago, 100 silos have been dug and filled."
