This morning the total for the Snyder gins was almost 4,000 bales-which was just about the county total Wednesday evening of last week. Cotton observers believe-and reports from a few out-of-town gins indicate-that other ginnings of the county are at least 3,000 bales.

The average guess has it that about one-third of the county crop has been ginned.
